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

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From the Vice-Chancellor

This year, USM retained her lead over local universities on SDG-driven policies, initiatives and accomplishments, as can be seen from the Times Higher Education (THE) Impact Rankings.

The same rating agency has also ranked USM the highest in Malaysia in terms of Global Employability, highlighting the quality of USM graduates. Meanwhile, Education Malaysia Global Services (EMGS), the agency that tracks the intake of international students by universities in Malaysia, ranked USM at number 1 for 2021 among all private and public universities.

USM's rooftop solar projects in her main and engineering campuses are currently the largest in terms of MW among all universities in Malaysia. USM's strong industrial collaborations saw a 200% increase in industrial grants secured in 2021, compared to 2019. USM currently hosts 15 spin-off companies with technologies ranging from AI to medical devices.

These are but a very small sample of USM's recent successes in the face of mounting competitions and challenges.

USM continues to grow with the support from all its communities.

Ink MoU on Staff and Student Exchange



In a historic first, Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) and Batangas State University (BatStateU), Philippines have signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to facilitate student mobility and staff exchange programmes.

The MoU was signed by both universities through a virtual ceremony conducted using the WebEx video conferencing application, in part due to restrictions on international travel brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The MoU would allow both institutions to encourage academic exchange among faculty members and student exchange via mobility programmes; implement beneficial activities and conduct collaborative projects such as research exchange on mutually identified subject matters.

USM Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic and International), Professor Dato' Dr. Narimah Samat signed the MoU on behalf of the university, while BatStateU was represented by its President, Dr. Tirso A. Ronquillo.

Present to witness the virtual signing ceremony were USM International Mobility and Collaboration Centre (IMCC) Acting Director, Aizat Hisham Ahmad; senior officers of the USM Academic Management Division along with various heads of departments of BatStateU.

USM, DITROLIC ENERGY SIGN PPA;

USM Turns to Solar-powered Electricity for Campus Use



Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) entered into a 20-year solar Power Purchase Agreement (PPA) with DITROLIC EnergySolutions Sdn. Bhd., a Malaysian clean energy solutions company for corporate and institutional customers in Southeast Asia, to set up a 10.6MWp on-site rooftop solar system in the varsity.

This cooperation in the installation of the solar photovoltaic (PV) system through a Request for Proposal (RFP) offer is believed to be the first of its kind and the single largest public university PPA deal in Malaysia.

By end of the year, with the completion of 22,374 pieces of solar modules installation across 90 buildings, solar carports and ground mounted system around its main campus, USM expects most of the energy supplied to its campuses to be clean and renewable.

The solar system will be able to generate power for 63.73% of its peak power demand. Over its lifetime, approximately 278,683MWh of clean energy will be generated, enabling USM to eliminate 217,705 tonnes of CO2 emissions in total.

Expressing his delight to be collaborating with DITROLIC Energy in this maiden project, USM Vice-Chancellor, Professor Dato' Dr. Faisal Rafiq Mahamd Adikan said, "With the installation of the solar modules in the main campus, USM will be among the first public university in the country to have up to 75% of its maximum demand and about 40% of the total usage for electricity to be generated by solar energy. This will in turn help the university to potentially save up to 30% on its utility bills."

"USM aims to lead into the future, and using clean and renewable solar energy will be among its prioritised initiative. This will ensure that USM can continue to be proactive in the fight against climate change, reducing its CO2 emissions, and at the same time reducing its energy cost.

"By end of the year, with the completion of 22,374 pieces of solar modules installation across 90 buildings, solar carports and ground mounted system around its main campus, USM expects most of the energy supplied to its campuses to be clean and renewable."



“This will also demonstrate the university’s serious efforts in pursuit of greener and cleaner energy source for the entire varsity and in doing so, contributes towards creating a sustainable future,” he said.

Faisal Rafiq added that USM is also optimistic to carry out similar arrangement to install solar systems at its Engineering Campus in Nibong Tebal with other companies around June or July next year.

Group CEO of Ditrolic Energy, Tham Chee Aun expressed his appreciation to be able to partner with USM, one of the oldest public university in Malaysia, in their journey to achieving net zero carbon emission.

“We are honored to become the clean energy partner for USM. This initiative will showcase to the nation as well as the students on how a leading public university can lead by example in the fight against climate change while hedging their energy cost at the same time.

USM VC Pays Courtesy Visit to EU AMBASSADOR

The Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) Vice-Chancellor, Professor Dato' Dr. Faisal Rafiq Mahamd Adikan paid a courtesy visit to the EU (European Union) Ambassador, His Excellency Michalis Rokas at the Eastern and Oriental (E&O) Hotel.

The Vice-Chancellor was accompanied by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic and International), Professor Dato' Gs. Dr. Narimah Samat.

The aim of the courtesy visit was for EU to provide insights into the collaboration with USM in areas of research, academic (Erasmus grant), webinars and conferences, sustainability, and the increasing enrolment of students from EU at USM.

As said by Faisal Rafiq during the discussion, USM has always prioritised on the growth of science and technology and sustainability-related matters, and the university is also keen on bringing experts from industries for future research development.

Following that, Michalis gave an overview on how the presence of EU embassies may serve to facilitate cooperation in relation to business and cultural matters, with established partnerships in industries, education, and economy.

From 2017 up until November 2021, collaborations between USM and EU countries have been established in the forms of Memorandum of Agreement (MoA), Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) and other agreements, totalling 80 in all.

Additionally, during the pre-COVID-19 era, USM has been receiving a huge number of exchange students from EU countries as well. However, the number has declined during the pandemic, with the exchange programme being conducted fully through programmes held online.

Overall, it was a short yet fruitful discussion between the two heads.

Also present at the discussion were Mr. Francesco Floris, EU First Counsellor Head of Trade and Economic Relations, and Mr. Pekka Pentilla, Trade and Economic Attachè.





As a full research mode student, I do not have much to say about the class situation and professorial influence in the classroom. Many USM professors, especially in my area of discipline (Management), have given much influence. I would like to express my thank you to all that assist me with this journey. My Dean Professor Noor Hazlina, Assoc. Professor Dr. Anees Janee, Professor T. Ramayah, Professor Surianty, Professor Azizah and much more. I would also like to thank the Vice-Chancellor Professor Dato' Dr. Faisal Rafiq, Professor Dr. Aldrin Abdullah and Professor Dato' Dr. Narimah who influenced me greatly.



Currently, I would say I am engaged in a dual assignment. First is my PhD research which is currently in the data analysis stage. My PhD research is within Human Resource Management (remember I mentioned my marriage to the HRM field), and my work is centered on employee engagement within the public sector organizations of developing nations. My current research seeks to address the current performance level of the public sector organizations through finding the proper drivers (i.e. antecedents) for employee engagement within the public sector whose motivation does not rely on profit generation. The main focus is to improve the way public servants perceive and get attached to their work as government employees in a more natural, spontaneous, and organic manner. It also focuses on improving the employees' psychological conditions to generate a more conducive work context, which would positively impact the overall performance of the public sector.



showcased 60 research papers.

USM 58TH CONVOCATION

A Success; Strict COVID-19 SOP Compliance Still A Priority

USM celebrates Convocation under new norm in COVID-19 era.

Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) recently concluded its 58th Convocation which began with the 2nd Session on Monday, 13 December 2021 at its historic Dewan Tuanku Syed Putra (DTSP) at the USM Main Campus.

The 1st session has been held earlier at Istana Arau, Perlis on 2nd December for the honorary degree recipients. The Chancellor graced the ceremony and presented the degrees to the 4 respective recipients and the Chancellor's Gold Medal Award to the best final year student in all fields.

The convocation continued with the 2nd Session from 13 December onwards for the next 9 days, with one session held each day in the morning. This was to facilitate the process of sanitisation of DTSP in the afternoon.

The three USM Pro-Chancellors handed out scrolls to 5,964 graduands in the nine sessions. This brings the number of USM alumni to 185,563.

For the 2nd session, a total of 538 graduands received their doctorate (PhD) degree, 1,361 master's degree, 4,031 bachelor's degrees and 34 diploma of nursing.

As the current COVID-19 situation demands strict compliance to preventive Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) from the government, USM has decided to only allow graduands to enter the hall.

At the same time, graduands and staff/committee members involved with the graduation ceremony were also required to follow strict SOPs.

A slight change in movement of graduands was established upon arriving at the campus grounds. Graduands were dropped off by their parents or family members at the 'Padang Kawad'. The USM commuter buses then transported

them to the 'Kompleks Dewan Kuliah', from which they proceeded to the adjacent DTSP on foot. Once the ceremony at DTSP ended, the graduands boarded the commuter buses to return to 'Padang Kawad', where they met and returned home with their parents or family members.

Similarly, only 30 people, namely members of the Board of Governors, the University top management and selected Senate members were allowed to be on stage for each session. The much trimmed down stage party was again in adherence to the SOPs.

Preparations at DTSP, which included the usual decoration of flowers and plants, were made, as are the banners and bunting which were placed at strategic locations throughout the Main Campus. The aim was to create a festive atmosphere, though on a slightly moderate scale.

USM recognises and appreciates the tireless efforts put in by its Convocation Working Committee which comprised mostly of its staff members over the past week in readying the Campus for the big day.

Bagi penerima Anugerah Pingat Emas Naib Canselor Pemimpin Pelajar Cemerlang pula dianugerahkan kepada Dr. Muhammad Mujaahid Mohd Amin yang kini berkhidmat sebagai Pegawai Perubatan Siswazah di Hospital Enche’ Besar Hajjah Kalsom, Kluang, Johor.

Muhammad Mujaahid yang meminati bidang pengurusan berkata, dia bercita-cita untuk menjadi Pengarah Kesihatan di Kementerian Kesihatan Malaysia (KKM), dengan menjadikan Tan Sri Dato’ Seri Dr. Noor Hisham Abdullah sebagai idolanya.

Muhammad Mujaahid pernah berkesempatan menyertai program Felo Perdana selama seminggu di bawah seliaan Menteri Kesihatan, Khairy Jamaluddin, tetapi kerana terikat dengan tempoh latihan housemanship di hospital, dia terpaksa menangguhkan penyertaannya dalam program tersebut.

Ia bermula dengan hanya sakit kepala yang tersangat kuat, yang kemudiannya perlu dirujuk ke hospital dan ketika dalam rawatan doktor telah mengesan terdapatnya tumor.

Keinginan, kesungguhan dan semangatnya masih mahu mengutamakan pelajaran ketika doktor mahu segarakan pembedahan, namun begitu beliau sedaya upaya meminta untuk menangguhkan pembedahan kerana terdapat lagi satu peperiksaan yang beliau perlu jalani ketika itu sebelum tamatnya pengajian.

Menerusi penganugerahan kali ini, para graduan masih berpeluang memakai jubah konvokesyen, merakamkan gambar kenangan dan akan menerima skrol serta transkrip seperti upacara konvokesyen seperti yang terdahulu, cuma yang membezakannya hanyalah SOP situasi pandemik.

“Sentiasa positif, jangan berfikir banyak dan jika sakit, dapatkan segera rawatan sebelum tumor membesar” ujar Chiew Rong, yang juga memberitahu penglihatannya menjadi semakin kurang dan beliau memberi nasihat dan kata-kata semangat kepada sesiapa yang mengalami nasib sepertinya.



Nadia yang berasal dari Sungai Petani, Kedah berkata, beliau telah selamat melahirkan bayi perempuan pada 22 November lalu.

“Upacara konvokesyen ini merupakan hari yang dinanti oleh semua graduan dan kehadiran saya ke upacara ini adalah dengan izin suami dan ibu kerana kesihatan saya yang semakin baik,” kata Nadia yang kini bekerja sebagai jurutera di syarikat Intel.

Both were elated and grateful, amidst the ceremony that was celebrated in a moderate yet meaningful manner.



Great apes, gibbons, monkeys, tarsiers, lemurs, and lorises make up the diverse and beautiful world of primates. Did you know that we share more than 90% of our DNA with most primate species and up to 97% with the orangutan? Malaysia is home to 25 different species of non-human primates. 'Non-human' because biologically speaking, we are 'primates', too!


Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) Muzium & Galeri Tuanku Fauziah (MGTF) has taken the initiative to advocate for primate conservation with a project called 'Project Monyet@USM'. It is a hybrid exhibition that showcases the works by Peter Ong, a wildlife photographer whose journey was to document Malaysia's diverse fascinating primate species. Alongside his primate portraits, this exhibition has also invited the public to contribute artworks and photographs about our arboreal cousins, encouraging the free use of media and style to highlight the diversity and wonders of these primates. Under the expertise of Dr. Nadine Ruppert, head of the Primate Research and Conservation Lab at the USM School of Biological Sciences (SBS), 'ProjectMonyet@USM' is curated by USM MGTF's Director, Associate Professor Hasnul Jamal Saidon and his curatorial team. In conjunction with the 'Project Monyet@USM' exhibition, another showcase of primate artworks entitled "LangUR – Building bridges between the worlds" ran at the Penang State Gallery between October until 14 December 2021. The LangUR art exhibition, curated by Ivan Alexander Francis Gabriel is a collaboration with 'Langur Project Penang (LPP)', which was founded by USM PhD student Jo Leen Yap and Dr. Nadine Ruppert back in 2016, with the aim to motivate and inspire local communities to be involved in activities relating to primate conservation and nature education.

The Project Monyet exhibition at MGTf

In an effort to raise the awareness of the public on Malaysian primates, Peter Ong, who is a passionate wildlife photographer and activist, managed to capture photos of 14 out of 25 species of primates. Alongside his primate portraits, the 'ProjectMonyet@USM' displays creative contributions from the public, through the free use of media and style to highlight the diversity and wonders regarding our arboreal cousins, who we call (pri-)MATES.

"When I met the renowned primatologist Dr Jane Goodall during her visit to Malaysia, she asked me on the state of primates in Malaysia. I was stunned and quickly searched through Google for information. To my surprise, I found hardly anything about the primate species in our country and yet, Malaysia is one of only two countries in Asia and five countries globally, that is home to members of five primate families. Malaysia is one of the 17 recognized megadiverse countries, which together hosts more than 70 percent of the world's biodiversity," Peter said.

"We cannot save anything if we do not know what to save. Conservation is not the main concern now, as we are still at ground zero. We are still at the awareness level."

He added that, "as a country, we do not know our own diversity and some of our children still think we have giraffes in Malaysia. Many of us thought that there is orangutan in Peninsular Malaysia. It's our natural heritage. How many kids have seen a Siamang? A Binturong? We do not want to wake up one day and realise that we have lost everything. Let's do something now."

"There's one time when I was taking a photo of a beruk kentoi (stump-tailed macaque) and randomly talked to the hikers while taking the photo. They were unaware and don't even know that [in Malaysia] beruk kentoi can only be found in Perlis."

We are blessed to have a country with rich biodiversity. The project also helps to support the researchers. It is not just our primates, we have endangered trees, our insects being wiped out and it's very sad that we are not playing our part to make things better. We have to be aware of what is happening to our biodiversity. Once it's gone, IT'S GONE; just like our Sumatran rhino. Now is the time Malaysians need to support our research.

Let's contribute something as simple as to dispose rubbish properly to save our biodiversity. Educate and engage with your children or students. Nurture the love for the primates at an early age. Inspire your children on the ways to make a difference. This is about their future, and they can share videos and stories through social media or even at home. As the saying goes, 'Sikit-sikit, lama-lama jadi bukit (in for a penny, in for a pound). Consistency will soon become a habit. We cannot do more things if we do not have enough awareness.

Let's take one example. The development in the area of Serdang had caused the hill to be cut off by the highway and to be surrounded with a huge housing development area. Little that we know, there in the small batches were gibbons that used to be a family of four and slowly they died and now we are left with the last one and nobody documented it.

The gibbon is as much a Malaysian as I am, as everyone else is. How is it that we think our life is worth more than his?

We cannot build another tiger; even money cannot buy the extinct species. However, buildings can be refurbished and rebuilt. We need the support from all levels of society to support our researchers. I believe knowledge is everything, to ensure that we are creating the appropriate awareness, and this is special as it is in our country, Malaysia. If we don't take this seriously, we will never know what we have in our own backyard," Peter concluded.


Dr. Nadine Ruppert, Head of the Primate Research and Conservation Lab at the USM School of Biological Sciences (SBS) shared with us that in Germany, her home country, there is no single primate species which exists there, not even in the whole of Europe, except for a tiny population of macaques at its most southern tip, in Gibraltar.

“We only have human ‘primates’ in Germany. But there are still some researchers wondering, why I didn’t study primates in Germany”.

Peter added that Malaysians are taking things for granted, “but not that we are doing it purposely, but because we don’t know and we lack the awareness.”

However, the feedback we received from the previous ‘Project Monyet’ and this project were incredible. It’s so good to know that people are sharing and exchanging thoughts on Facebook and Instagram. Now that we have the iNaturalist app, all of primate sightings by citizen scientists in Malaysia can be shared and linked. The app is useful in helping to cite data and USM is doing a wonderful effort in supporting the project.

“All my first-year students need to install iNaturalist to capture data of the rich biodiversity in their backyards and in USM. This is their assignment. They will need to upload their observations of plants and animals to the iNaturalist Project “BioDiv Universiti Sains Malaysia” and so they simultaneously engage with nature. We are happy that we have more data now recording more than 800 different species of plants and animals on USM’s main campus.” (Link: <https://www.inaturalist.org/projects/biodiv-universiti-sains-malaysia>)

Nadine added, “Educating the students and the USM community on how they can contribute to recognizing and protecting biodiversity is just one piece of a bigger puzzle in producing the big picture before trying to educate more people about protecting Malaysia’s threatened wildlife, like the primates”.

“We have also been engaging citizen scientists to report sightings of endangered gibbons in Malaysia to us to create better maps. We have received updates through Facebook postings from the hiking groups, where they share a photo or sound recording of gibbons. The hikers’ posts contributed in helping to protect the gibbons as now, we know more about where they are.”

“We have to stop questioning whose job it is to protect biodiversity; it’s everyone’s and it’s my job. As a Malaysian, it is my job to make sure that the land is doing fine. Let’s start by doing the job and making a difference. It is the least you can do to take the responsibility,” said Peter.

Peter, who managed to compile photos of 14 out of 25 Malaysian primate species, shared that it was challenging to capture some species as we do not have accurate data. Among the hardest to capture was the East Borneo Grey Gibbon at a small village in Sabah called Long Pasia. The journey took eight hours by car; four hours by road and four hours off-road. It was adventurous, and it provided a unique glimpse into rural Borneo, located near East Kalimantan. The journey was long but offered great rewards as the village was beautiful and very clean.

Trying to capture a good shot of an East Bornean Grey Gibbon is another story, as the species is confined to thick primary rainforests in the lowland and lower mountainous areas of north and northeast Borneo and East Kalimantan. Gibbons are exclusively arboreal, and do not descend to the ground and they stay in the tallest tree. They will swing from tree to tree, so you need to be very quick before they disappear.

Peter has always loved animals and wanted to pursue studies in Zoology, but instead he graduated with Law from the University of Bristol and completed his Master’s in Economics.

“I was born in a generation where only certain careers were acceptable, such Medicine, Engineering, Finance, and Law. However after earning both my degrees, I decided to pursue what I love to do most. Dr Goodall’s questions on our primates encouraged me further to be part of capturing our biodiversity and help our researchers in collecting data. She has instilled my interest in photography and in finding out more about our primates.”

His avian and primate images have also been featured by Canon Malaysia on their social media feeds and their annual corporate calendar. He is currently a board member of Roots & Shoots and is one of the mentors of the Roots & Shoots Malaysia Award (RASMA) programme, where he interacts with and encourages youths to get involved with Malaysian NGOs to be part of the solution on the issues faced by wildlife, society and environment.

Peter added, “Be the people that is worthy of the land. It’s a blessed land. This land is home to other beings, too. We as human beings, with our brain capacity and compassion, can make a difference. We can be the steward, the custodian that we were meant to be. We can do better. It needs to start with ourselves”.

“As humans, we need to value life, and the life of animals should not be any less than a human’s life. Life is life.”

“What I love most when taking photos of primates is the moment when you look at their eyes, you can see the mutual intelligence, and the ability to recognise and feel; that there’s a thought process going on. You can see that he is interested in you, as you are interested in him immediately. You can feel the deep connection. So I wonder, why would anyone think that his right to enjoy this land is worth less than my right to enjoy the land? Why can’t we share? We have been sharing this land for so long. The ugly truth is humans tend to want to possess, to own everything.”

“As we know, there are more tigers in captivity in the United States than in the wild around the world. Why do we have to own everything that we see? We need to protect the wildlife for our children because the wildlife is part of the children’s future. As human beings with high intelligence, we are depriving our children of the chance of a better life in the future, with fresh air and clean water. We have already witnessed that rapid development can lead to numerous natural disasters and extinction of species. It’s time that we step up, because there’s urgency in this matter.”

“We are losing so much of the natural heritage in Malaysia. We have to be aware that development comes with a price. There must be proper planning on how to move forward, and to consider the needs of nature seriously. Cutting some trees might be of little consequence to our human ‘primate’ eyes, but it could lead to a reduction in food supplies, inbreeding, and stress on the wildlife. That will create a big impact on our biodiversity. Many habitats will become lost or fragmented due to deforestation. Concurrently, it will lead to an increase in poaching activities when forests are made more accessible by nearby development,” said Nadine.



“Educate yourself not to feed wildlife. Even if you want to feed stray cats and dogs, take responsibility to bring them to the vet and neuter them, if not they will just reproduce more and more and can become aggressive or sick,”

Nadine added that gibbons are in many ways like humans. “They can only have one baby every five to seven years. So, when you take the baby from its mother, can you imagine how the mother’s heart is ‘ripped out’ when her baby was taken to be sold in the illegal wildlife pet trade? When you take away the babies to be sold, there will be no offspring that replenish the already threatened population. Gibbons also play an important role in the forest because there are some trees that can only grow from interactions with these primates, so taking away primary seed dispersers will eventually lead to a decline in plant diversity too. Probably you don’t see it, but it’s an evil synergy. Every threat will be affecting another threat,” said Nadine further.

To take a quote from Sir David Attenborough, “A tale of the smartest species doomed by that all-too-human-characteristic of failing to see the bigger picture, in pursuit of short term goals”.

“Primates in an intact forest do not want to seek contact with humans. Having the trees in the forest as their natural habitat, they do not want to make contact with you at all. Remember how Peter needed to wait so long to get the photos?”

“But we as humans, we tend to empathise. We always feel the monkeys do not have enough food. We are overwhelmed by the primates’ cuteness, thus we will feed them and then can easily take their photo. Once you start feeding them, you’ve done the worst thing. Never feed any wildlife just because you feel pity for them! They will survive. They have lived for thousands of years, and the jungle is their place. They can eat leaves and shoots and grass.

“Obviously, they our food, our food has better flavours and is rich in sugar and fat. When we start feeding them, the primates’ natural behaviour will be affected in some way. They will become interested in humans, and they’ll start to picture us as their food source.. They can become aggressive when we keep feeding them, and they will breed more and more and this can lead to a reduced food supply. It will further result in the transmission of diseases. And now with Covid-19, primates can become infected too. We can transmit the virus to them.

“Human interacting with wildlife is always a negative thing. We do not want this to happen. I saw a lot of photos being uploaded at Kuala Selangor, where the public are feeding the langurs and macaques, while taking selfies with the primates. Of course, they will become tame and climb onto your shoulders and head. I was actually shouting to myself when I saw the posts. Let’s not forget that the primates have a high risk of being infected with various disease, as we do, they could have herpes, hepatitis, tuberculosis, parasites, and we could then re-infect each other.

“Educate yourself not to feed wildlife. Even if you want to feed stray cats and dogs, take responsibility to bring them to the vet and neuter them, if not they will just reproduce more and more and can become aggressive or sick,” Nadine concluded.

This project is hoped to address the problem and create awareness that each of us can do something to protect our rich biodiversity. It could also help us to understand better and be more aware in bringing people closer to our interesting biological heritage through the arts on Malaysia’s diverse primate community. The exhibition at USM MGTF is open to the public free-of-charge from 25 October to 15 January 2022. Visitors will get to experience, explore, discover, and learn more about the primates’ habitats, survival, and challenges that they have to face and encounter in their lives.

Dr. Nadine Rupert's Top 3 Primates "Fun" Fact:

1. Pig-tailed macaques ('beruk'). From our research ('Macaca Nemestrina Project') we learned that, apart from owls, macaques too are good rat-catchers. The presence of pig-tailed macaques in oil palm plantations is normally be associated with the kind of animals having destructive and uncontrolled behaviour. However, macaques undeniably have a distinct role in maintaining the ecosystem, more specifically as seed dispersers in the forest and as nature's pest controllers in agriculture.

With these findings, we can promote greater awareness to the oil palm planters to leave the macaques alone, as they are contributing positively to support and sustain the palm oil industry with their voracious appetite for rats, which are known to cause damage to oil palm fruits on a large scale. By allowing the macaques to continue living amongst the oil palms, it would not only protect the threatened species and other forest-dwellers, but it could also bring greater economic benefits to the farmers. What's more interesting is that these macaques could serve as an alternative to the use of harmful pesticides, commonly used as conventional means in dealing with crop-damaging rodents.

The farmers and oil planters could help save the habitat by taking care of our tropical rainforest more carefully, as it serves as a natural habitat that would support the living ways of these primates which are being threatened.

Nadine said that habitat conservation activities around oil palm plantations positively contribute to enhancing greener practices in the pursuit of sustainable palm oil production. By allowing the macaques to enter oil palm plantations from nearby protected forests and wildlife corridors, it would not only protect the threatened species and other forest-dwellers, but it could also bring greater economic benefits to the farmers.

2. Raffles' banded langur. Probably the most endangered primate in Peninsular Malaysia (only found in Johor and a small patch in Rompin). They are listed as Critically Endangered and we do not have enough valid data of their remaining number, although they sometimes even roam in housing areas. This is not actually a fun fact, as it is sad. However, I would like to create awareness that the public can help in the process of gathering data whenever they see the langur. We want people to know and to help save them.

Be careful not to mistake them with the **Robinsons banded langur**, which can only be found in the northern states of Peninsular Malaysia. Even when we think we might know their differences, actually we might not. They are always playing with us. Now, that's a fun fact. They look the same but they are not the same.

3. Slow lorises ('Kongkang'). This primate is only active at night. Even if we want to find them during the day, they will be sleeping. 'Kongkang' is being overtraded as a pet, because of their cute looks. However, do not be fooled by their cute looks, as they are the only primate that is venomous.

'Kongkang' has a toxic bite, a trait rare among mammals and unique among the primates. The toxin is obtained by licking a sweat gland under their arm, and the secretion is activated by mixing with saliva. Their venomous bite could cause a severe allergic reaction to most people, and it can worsen into

an epileptic shock for some people. Still, you can scroll on social media and see that many people are happily playing with them and keeping them as a pet. Most often, they have plugged out the teeth of this primate leading to severe pain and potentially deadly infections. The illegal wildlife trade is such a horrible and damaging activity to our country. Please never keep primates as pets!

KAWAN is divided into two segments, one is where international student ambassadors look after their communities and manage events in sync with USMi; and two, is the buddy/agent system that facilitates the recruitment of new international students without any monetary benefit from the students. KAWAN recruitment is via a system where the applications are screened and a panel of IMCC staff will shortlist the applicants for interview. For both USMi and KAWAN, local students can also apply to bridge the gap between the international and locals students. Students who are interested in volunteering for USMi or KAWAN, can contact the USMi president, vice-president and KAWAN coordinator, respectively. They can be reached out through IMCC website, WhatsApp, Facebook, and Instagram.

USMi, a family of international students, aims to provide a space for international and Malaysian students at the University to interact and unleash their creativity in sharing each other’s cultural identity within the USM community. It is an initiative that directs the two to understand each other through various events and programs and create harmony between the local and international students. USMi is the place for anyone who is hoping for diversity, support and entertainment. USMi prepares new students and visitors to get acclimatized to the campus life, history, traditions, and achievements of the college through the Student Life & Leadership Departments. It also conducts campus tours and supports Presidential and Foundation functions other than organising cultural events. USMi’s Executive Members handle alumni relations. One major highlight is the event called USMi Motivates where the alumni shared their experiences as well as how USM helped build their careers and future.

KAWAN, known as students' ambassadors, is a new volunteer initiative to facilitate and assist postgraduate international students. The group of KAWAN helps aspiring international students in the process of applying for admission to pursue their academic careers at USM. A KAWAN can be a student from any of the schools at USM, providing individualized assistance to an applicant seeking admission. Besides that, the service of KAWAN is pro bono and unconditional. Strictly a voluntary job and, as such, no KAWAN can be branded as a full-time agent.



In most cases, USMi and KAWANs work together under the supervision of IMCC. This collaboration has worked well. Some of the key events organised by this collaboration, such as Familiarisation (2019), Penang Hill Trip (2020), Ramadhan Football Championship (2021) and Ramadhan Iftaar Gathering (2021), need to be highlighted here. USMi, soon, will be emphasizing a broader scope that will include a group of international students from the attachment programme, UG and PG.

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

Sebelum ini saya banyak membuat karya berbentuk catan dua dimensi dan lukisan arang kerana ia merupakan antara kekuatan saya sejak dari universiti lagi. Bermula tahun 2021, saya mula membuat eksperimentasi medium kaca gentian secara serius dan konsisten. Bagi saya medium kaca gentian ini amat menarik jika ia digunakan sebagai salah satu media dan alternatif dalam berkarya kerana ia mampu memberikan hasil di luar jangka dari segi bentuk, ruang dan teksturnya. Buat masa sekarang, saya juga aktif membuat lukisan arang kerana seni ini merupakan satu proses awal ke arah menghasilkan idea-idea karya yang lebih kuat dan bermakna.

Sejajurnya penyertaan saya dalam UOB POY ini sudah bermula selepas tamat pengajian di USM lagi. Hampir saban tahun mencuba dan kebanyakan karya saya hanya terpilih dan melepasi peringkat ke penilaian akhir, namun tidak terpilih sebagai pemenang sehinggalah tahun 2021 menjadi rezeki saya untuk mendapat tempat sebagai salah seorang pemenang. Bagi saya keluarga faktor utama yang sering memberikan galakan kepada saya untuk menyertai pertandingan berprestij ini. Sekarang isteri dan anak saya juga turut menjadi pendorong kuat menyokong saya dalam pertandingan UOB POY dan apa jua pameran seni yang berlangsung dalam acara seni di Malaysia. Semua insan ini menjadi kekuatan dan inspirasi sebenar saya untuk lebih bersemangat bagi menghasilkan karya yang lebih baik.


Saya tidak dapat untuk menjelaskan secara lanjut cara mendapatkan sumber inspirasi untuk menghasilkan karya tersebut. Cuma yang boleh saya katakan ia merupakan salah satu proses kematangan seorang artis dalam berkarya iaitu ia melibatkan masa, pengorbanan tenaga, pembentukan proses berfikir secara kritis dan juga pemerhatian pada persekitaran seni semasa. Pengalaman bergiat aktif sebagai artis seni selama lebih kurang 8 tahun banyak membantu saya membentuk corak dan gaya seni sendiri walaupun pada awalnya masih ada sedikit pengaruh daripada artis rujukan yang lain. Namun pengalaman yang banyak mengajar dan membantu saya untuk menghasilkan karya sendiri yang lebih kukuh dan kritis.

'Ragaman' merupakan satu karya yang saya anggap cukup istimewa. Ia merupakan usaha pertama saya menghasilkan karya sepenuhnya dari medium kaca gentian yang bukan kekuatan saya dalam berkarya sebelum ini. Banyak proses eksperimentasi dan percubaan berlaku sepanjang proses menghasilkannya. Karya ini sebenarnya membawa tema kekeluargaan dan situasi yang pernah saya alami sewaktu membesar di kampung halaman di Terengganu.

Sewaktu darjah lima sekitar tahun 2001, saya dan keluarga telah berpindah dan tinggal di rumah nenek secara sementara bersama beberapa keluarga yang lain. Sepanjang tempoh tinggal sebumbung bersama yang lain saya banyak melihat pelbagai sifat dan ragam setiap orang di rumah tersebut. Walaupun keluarga besar ini merupakan saudara sendiri, namun perbezaan sifat dan ragam setiap orang itu menarik minat saya untuk dijadikan sebagai isu karya kerana terkandung pelbagai elemen satira, kelucuan, ketegasan, kasih sayang dan perbezaan haluan.

Saya juga memasukkan elemen tradisional dalam karya ini sebagai simbolik bahawa semua penceritaan ini berlaku di rumah nenek di Terengganu. Atap singgora yang terkenal dalam pembuatan rumah tradisional di Terengganu dan Kelantan telah dibentuk kembali dalam karya ini sebagai satu visual yang jelas untuk menyokong kisah kehidupan sebumbung beberapa keluarga di dalam sebuah rumah di kampung halaman. Elemen pepotong seakan wayang kulit juga dijadikan elemen penting untuk membina watak-watak bertujuan mewakili sifat dan ragam yang berbeza setiap orang dalam karya tersebut. Proses pembentukan karya ini sedikit rumit dan memerlukan ketelitian yang tinggi untuk membentuk potongan yang dikehendaki termasuk membuat himpunan bagi setiap watak. Secara asasnya, fizikal karya ini bersifat tiga dimensi dan berbentuk pepotong untuk memberikan kesan yang lebih jelas melalui komposisi, teknikal dan estetika medium kaca gentian itu sendiri.

He is a proud USM alumni member, who graduated in 1988 with a Bachelor of Science (Hons), a Master's Degree in 1994 and later receiving his PhD in 2007. Throughout his career, he has been a research officer, a teacher, a lecturer, a consultant and he has also served at the Ministry of Science, Technology and Innovation (MOSTI) for three years. Besides being heavily involved in academic journey for 32 years, he is also actively contributing to the community. Currently he is involved with association such as MUFAKAT and MSA (Malaysia Science Association) Northern Zone. During his leisure time, he will spend his time cooking for his family and staff. His signature dish is Mutton Kurma.

I registered in 1984 as a student, who went through the process via the second intake. As a student, I hardly went home for the semester break, even though my hometown is in Kulim. I would stay on campus and assist my lecturers with various kinds of projects. Indirectly, that had increased my knowledge and love for research. To be honest, I have always been passionate about research. However, many of my colleagues told me that I have the makings of a good teacher. Probably then it became a du'a and made me into what I am now.

"After graduating and then employed directly for research project in USM were big achievements for me. While doing research, I also pursued my Master's Degree in Biochemistry. I have gained a lot of exposure in teaching, handling projects, requesting grants and supervising students while working as a research officer and a student. Upon completion of my Master's Degree, I was appointed as a Chemistry teacher at the USM Matriculation Centre" said Amirul.

"I would like to thank everyone who has taught me especially my supervisors, Prof. Dr. Mohd. Azizan Mohd. Noor and Prof. Dato' Dr. Mohamed Isa Abd Majid. Thank you!"

While working at the Matriculation Centre, through word of mouth, he also did part-time tutoring to the children of USM staff and the matriculation centre. Most of his students said his energetic approach to teaching and learning invigorated the students and kept them focused.

"I taught Chemistry in Matriculation and definitely it is hard to explain something that you cannot see. So, you need to be creative in commanding the classroom and in engaging with the students. When I look at their faces, I will know either they understand my lectures or they just give me an empty nod," he added.

“Over the years, I found that as I was becoming more and more entrenched in research and teaching, I was still keeping my dream of becoming a lecturer. I love what lecturers do, and always wonder whether “can I become a lecturer one day?” I also had very good role models in academia that cemented my feelings during my time as a student. My dream came true when I received the offer letter from SBS in 2000 for a lecturer’s post.”

“I liked working with students. I wanted my students to experienced what I’ve gained during my student days. I was comfortable where I was then until the late Professor Dr. Ahyaudin Ali (Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Research & Development then) motivated me to pursue my PhD. So, I challenged myself again by enrolling part-time for my PhD, while continue to work in USM. I could have opted for another university, but it seemed that my fate had been written at USM, and it was the best option for me as I had just settled down with a family.”

Amirul completed his Doctorate in 2007. “It was a challenging and exciting journey even if it took me seven years to complete my research and thesis. My whole PhD journey had been sponsored by the University. Thank you USM!”

“Besides serving at SBS, Amirul was also seconded to MOSTI for three years as the Director of Bioprocess. Working with the Ministry is totally new, with a 360-degree difference. The greatest challenge was in having to start from scratch; even the office building was not yet there. I had to learn from the development process, which was new knowledge for me and of course, I experienced the way how the Ministry operated. There are numerous different procedures compared to the University. I described my secondment as part of my leadership training.

“When I returned to USM, I was entrusted to be the Deputy Dean in Academic and a Deputy Dean in Research. At the same time, I was appointed as Deputy Director at the Centre for Chemical Biology (CCB). In 2016, I was appointed as the Dean of SBS. I like that I have the opportunity to make decisions and to change things that I thought needed to be changed and of course not alone, but within my teams. I like dealing with people. I like solving problems. I believed that the Deans were making a difference in students’ lives and I wanted to be part of that. These were opportunities that not everyone would get, so I made the most of them.”

In between his various university positions, he wrote a research book, numerous international and local journals. “As I’ve been nurtured by my mother, I would start my days very early. I will be around the campus at 7.00am, settling administrative work and ending my days at 7.00pm after my session with the students. Normally, I will allocate my time to meet my students at 5.00pm onwards. That’s my routine every day. If I reach home early, my family will be asking if I’m not feeling well, hahaha.”

We all know children tend to observe, imitate and follow the activities carried out by their parents and siblings. As for Amirul, coming from a poor family, it was challenging enough. When his father passed away, he was only six years old when the family lost one of their breadwinners. His mother became a single mother, being the one who made sure all of them have food on their table. There were some of the days that they would not have any food at all.

I will always try my best to provide a clear picture to my students. I could detect from their faces whether they could follow my lecture or not."

"COVID-19 gave me big challenges, as I have to admit that I am an 'old school guy' who prefers face-to-face interaction. I want to engage my students and see their facial expression. I will simply throw a question to those who seemed distracted from the class, to check whether they have understood the lecture. From there, you could solve the problem directly in making sure they understood the subject. However, when you teach online, you will be talking alone, rarely see their faces and hardly any questions asked. Probably the newer generations enjoy the online learning style. You could even do blended classrooms with regard to the new normal, and with various types of technology which are now emerging. Still, if given a choice, I would prefer the students to be in front of me."


When asked why USM then became his choice, Amirul paused for a while before continuing with his sharing. "There's no word

to describe why I chose USM. The moment I registered as a student in 1984, I already became attached to my alma mater. Apart from being 'fated', it felt so right to serve USM. When I started my career as a lecturer, most of my colleagues were offered to serve at other places. I had to admit, there were junctions for me as well, but the path had been set up. I belonged to USM; the ambience, the love of what I'm doing. Even when I started as a contract staff, I feel so attached to USM."

"So, how does it relate to my story in USM?", you might ask. As a matter of fact, I was offered to pursue my Bachelor's Degree in Accounting at two universities, one being USM. One of the many reasons I chose USM was because there was a special programme (i.e.,Warga Sukan) for athletes like me which offers a 50% discount for our annual tuition fees. Being a typical future accountant, saving costs is always a priority. Also, SOM is located at the main campus, which is closer to home in Penang, saving me even more costs.

"But why accounting?", you might ask further. My love for accounting began when I was in secondary school. I have always wanted to start my own business and I realized early that knowledge in accounting is important to understand the condition of the business and is useful in making business decisions. Hence, I took an extra subject in Principles of Accounting during my SPM, even though I was a science stream student. I had been accepted into the local matriculation programme in accounting and lo and behold, on 1 September 2014, I was finally at the USM main campus for my orientation week as a newly-minted student of USM.

One of the best things in USM was that it provided many avenues and opportunities for students to explore and to do things which are worthwhile, given that the students take the effort to find that opportunity. During my time in USM, I took the liberty to venture into starting up a few businesses, which ultimately failed (a different story for another day). At one point, I almost quit my degree to pursue a business opportunity with a friend in Universiti Teknologi Malaysia, Johor. I honestly thought I might be the next successful college dropout like Bill Gates or Mark Zuckerberg. Fortunately, I had a heart-to-heart chat with the Deputy Dean of SOM of the day, and he managed to talk some sense into me to continue my degree.

As part of the requirement for the Warga Sukan programme, I needed to undergo my training every weekday and to represent USM in swimming competitions throughout my four (4) years in USM. Eventually, in my 4th year, I had the opportunity to set up a joint-venture with a few fellow USM swimming team members to form a swimming academy to provide learn-to-swim lessons in USM.

We sent a proposal to the USM Pusat Sukan to rent the swimming pool in USM to conduct our lessons on weekends and it was approved by Pusat Sukan. The business proved to be quite successful, and we were profitable. At its highest point, we had more than 120 active students learning with us in a single month.

My 4th year in USM was the busiest and the most productive. On top of all the accounting subjects getting tougher, daily training schedule and swimming lessons on weekends, I further participated in many business case study presentation/competitions and represented SOM and USM in many national-level competitions against other top tier universities in Malaysia. I was elected as the team leader in those competitions, and we managed to make SOM and USM proud by becoming the Malaysian grand finalists in ICAEW Business Case Challenge 2018 and semi-finalists in HSBC's Business Case Challenge 2018. Did I also mention that I was also the USM swimming team captain for the 2017/2018 academic year?

Medan Pantun Arena Persilangan Budaya

Umum beranggapan bahawa pengucapan pantun ialah adat dan tradisi khusus bagi masyarakat Melayu yang sering kali dapat dilihat penggunaannya dalam majlis keramaian seperti kenduri kahwin serta persembahan seni. Sesuatu yang di luar kebiasaan tercetus apabila salah seorang bekas pemantun Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM), Viknesvaran A/L Kandasamy (B. Tech. '13) yang berbangsa India, melibatkan diri secara mendalam dalam warisan berpantun. Penglibatan beliau dalam gelanggang seni interaksi unik ini bermula sejak beliau terlibat sebagai Exco Majlis Penghuni Desasiswa Restu pada tahun 2011.



"Tugas saya lebih kepada membantu dalam persiapan pasukan pantun Desasiswa Restu dan menguruskan hal ehwal pentadbiran termasuklah pendaftaran peserta, penginapan dan sebagainya sewaktu menjelang Pesta Pantun Antara Desasiswa USM (PADU). Tidak terlintas pada akal fikiran saya untuk turut sama bersaing sebagai pemantun di mana-mana acara pantun antara desasiswa

apatah lagi intervarsiti. Lebih manis lagi, penyertaan saya sebagai pemantun bermula secara tidak sengaja apabila pada tahun 2012, Pesta Pantun Bestari anjuran Kolej Kediaman Ke-4 (BESTARI) di Universiti Malaya, meletakkan syarat baru iaitu setiap pasukan perlu mempunyai sekurang-kurangnya seorang pemantun bukan Melayu. Oleh hal yang demikian, jurulatih pasukan pantun USM pada ketika itu, Allahyarham Encik Ezal Ezham meminta saya untuk turut serta dalam acara tersebut. Oleh sebab usaha jurulatih kami, Pesta Pantun Bestari yang berlangsung di Universiti Malaya pada tahun 2013, menjadi titik tolak penglibatan aktif saya dalam arena pantun."

Kejuaraan yang disandang oleh beliau bukan sahaja pada peringkat desasiswa USM, malah pada peringkat varsiti serta luar negara juga. Coretan kenangan manis ini terpahat di Universiti Malaya melalui pertandingan Pesta Pantun Bestari pada tahun 2013.

“Saya pada mulanya tidak menyangka yang saya mampu menghasilkan pantun secara spontan dalam masa kurang daripada 60 saat dan mampu memberikan tentangan hebat kepada pasukan-pasukan yang tidak kurang hebatnya dari universiti lain. Berkat tunjuk ajar jurulatih dan rakan sepasukan, kami berjaya merangkul Johan sekaligus mencatatkan kemenangan kali ke-3 berturut-turut buat USM. Saya juga turut terlibat dalam acara-acara pantun di luar negara, khususnya di Singapura.

Baru-baru ini, saya bersama-sama dengan tiga lagi rakan dari USM, menyertai Pertandingan Lafazkan Pantun 2.0 anjuran Dewan Bahasa dan Pustaka, dan kami berjaya merangkul Naib Johan. Tambahan pula, penyertaan ini merupakan penyertaan kali kedua kami dalam pertandingan seumpamanya dan dalam edisi sulung yg diadakan pada tahun 2020, pasukan kami memenangi tempat ketiga.”



Berbekalkan pengalaman dan pengetahuan yang sedia ada, beliau turut aktif melibatkan diri sebagai juri serta tenaga pengajar teknik berpantun. Antara penglibatan beliau sebagai juri isi adalah pada tahun 2016 di Pesta Pantun Piala Seri Melaka dan di Pesta Pantun Antara Desasiswa Universiti (PADU) pada tahun 2019. Pada tahun yang sama, beliau turut dijemput sebagai juri di pesta pantun anjuran Universiti Kebangsaan Singapura (NUS). Beliau turut berkongsi ilmu dan bakat yang dimiliki dengan pelajar-pelajar sekolah di Singapura. Kemahiran yang diketengahkan oleh beliau dalam perkongsian tersebut ialah cara-cara khusus untuk menghasilkan pembayang yang berkualiti serta teknik yang sistematik untuk menghasilkan sesebuah pantun.

“Pantun yang sempurna dilengkapi dengan pembayang dan maksud yang baik. Pembayang perlu mengambil kira unsur alam semula jadi tanpa mengubah sifat asli unsur tersebut. Fungsi bahagian maksud pula ialah menyampaikan sesuatu maklumat bagi tujuan tertentu seperti berpesan-pesan tentang sesuatu isu. Pada hemat saya, pengucapan pantun merupakan kearifan tempatan yang menonjolkan kebolehan warga setempat menggunakan hasil pemerhatian mereka terhadap alam semula jadi lalu menerapkan unsur tersebut ke dalam puisi tradisional,” tambah beliau lagi.



“Saya juga turut terlibat dalam beberapa acara secara maya dan salah satu acara yang saya kira sangat bermakna buat saya ialah acara yang dianjurkan Balai Pantun Singapura yang mengumpulkan para pemantun dari Nusantara (Malaysia, Singapura dan Indonesia) dan kami berkongsi pengalaman dan perjalanan kami sepanjang terlibat dalam arena pengucapan pantun ini.”

Selain berdepan dengan era pasca COVID-19 ini, pelbagai sektor terutama sektor perkhidmatan dan pendidikan turut terjejas kerana menghadapi kekangan untuk berkumpul secara fizikal sebagai ekoran Perintah Kawalan Pergerakan (PKP). Walau bagaimanapun, harapan beliau agar aktiviti seni seperti pantun dan puisi tradisional dapat diberikan perhatian oleh pelbagai pihak penganjur secara maya, agar seni ini tidak ditinggalkan. Beliau turut menegaskan bahawa penggiat seni khususnya bukan hanya disarankan untuk menganjurkan aktiviti pertandingan semata-mata, malahan menitikberatkan hal perkongsian ilmu dan wacana. Hal ini demikian kerana acara seperti ini dapat memangkin dan mengekalkan aspek estetik semangat berpantun yang ada dalam diri seseorang untuk kekal aktif berseni.







"She further said that, encouragement from friends and her seniors made her even more determined, to the extent of trying to secure a sponsorship to study in India as she did not want to burden her parents."



One of the more prominent features of the university is 'Tasik Harapan', a lake located close to the campus mosque fronting the side entrance. It's a favourite spot for the campus citizens to keep fit amidst nature.

No Godzilla or any other underwater creature has been seen here, save for the resident monitor lizards or 'Goji', at times seen in the university Facebook postings, highlighted along with other parts of the natural landscape of the 'university in a garden'.

Recently however, academicians from the USM School of Mathematical Sciences (located within the vicinity of the lake) have shared some of their work regarding the lake and its condition.

Associate Professor Dr. Teh Su Yean, Dr. Mohd Hafiz Mohd, Dr. Tay Chai Jian and Professor Dr. Koh Hock Lye (from Sunway University, formerly from USM) have been doing mathematical modelling research work in biological fields such as COVID-19, epidemiology and ecology, to name a few.

Hafiz said, more research from the mathematical modelling fields can be done on the aspect of biodiversity in this university. One example will be on the Goji's habitat i.e., 'Tasik Harapan' USM, which has been their living place for a long time.

"It has been reported by some studies that the algal concentration in 'Tasik Harapan' may reach 300 µg/L. This result implies a highly eutrophic condition and some steps to remedy this problem should be taken," Hafiz said.

***Eutrophication: excessive richness of nutrients in a lake or other body of water, frequently due to run-off from the land, which causes a dense growth of plant life.*



In order to address some of these issues, this team has employed mathematical modelling and dynamical systems techniques to examine the algae-phosphorus interactions and its combined influences with distinct biological factors in mediating eutrophication dynamics in Tasik Harapan.

Their work has recently been published in the Journal of Theoretical Biology (Q2 with IF 2.691) and the paper can be found below:

Overall, the modelling work suggests that a combination of external phosphorus loading, algal mortality, and internal phosphorus recycling rates play an important role in the eutrophication process which occurred within the lake, particularly in a shallow tropical lake like 'Tasik Harapan'.

Therefore, Su Yean explained, to facilitate the restoration process of 'Tasik Harapan' in the future, methods to reduce internal phosphorus recycling such as sediment dredging and flushing are recommended, in conjunction with the control of external phosphorus loading.

"Research work such as this will surely highlight USM's role as one of the top universities in relation to the world sustainability rankings.

"At the same time, it can also demonstrate the efforts done by USM in the preservation of nature and its green areas, which are integral in spurring the university's development of the intellect, and thus enhancing the spirit and practice of nature conservation," she added.

Yes, Godzilla exists only on the silver screen, the product of a fertile imagination.

However, the 'Goji' that we can see around 'Tasik Harapan' can definitely serve as an impetus in developing research ideas through creativity, in understanding more about our surroundings and what we can do to improve its existence.

Let's take the lead.
