USM RECEIVES MOSTI MINISTER, Holds Briefing on Latest Development

A discussion between Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) and the Institute of Pharmaceutical and Nutraceutical Malaysia (IPHARM) under the Ministry of Science, Technology and Innovation (MOSTI) was held at the University Innovative Incubator (I2U) building at Bukit Jambul. The discussion was aimed at increasing collaborations in the field of pharmaceuticals between IPHARM and the USM School of Pharmaceutical Sciences to produce products and also pharmaceutical and medical services that can be commercialised.

According to the Minister of Science, Technology and Innovation Malaysia, Khairy Jamaluddin, this collaboration will be extended further into researches and commercialisation. Although currently there is already commercialisation being done in this field at USM, he is prioritising on the research that has already begun at IPHARM.

“We can focus on certain products by doing research relating to dengue, kratom/ketum leaves as a pharmaceutical product and also on other aspects of pharmacy that can be looked into,” said Khairy.

At the meeting too, the USM Vice-Chancellor, Professor Dr. Faisal Rafiq Mahamd Adikan explained to Khairy Jamaluddin, on the efforts by USM to embrace the future.

Faisal Rafiq shared information on how USM provides access to opportunities for students and staff, who mostly belong to the B40 category; the percentage of students and staff who are disabled (OKU); the breakdown of the Heads of Departments (HOD) in terms of gender, and the fact that most of them being first-generation degree holders.

He continued his briefing by highlighting the performance of the academics, in terms of productivity and efficiency.

“Focusing on the duties of the academics in producing publications and doing supervision (of students), the number of publications peaked in 2014, but later declined and showed drastic fluctuations until 2019; on the other hand, the supervision of students was at the highest in 2011, then fluctuated, again reaching a high level in 2015 but declined in 2016, only to rise and tapered off at almost the same level of achievements as for the publications,” he explained.

He then said, the I2U Centre will also be utilised as a space to host activities relating to research and commercialisation, and will be provided to the industry research partners that have strategic collaborations with USM in various fields such as electronics, IoT, IC (integrated circuit) design, semiconductors, AI and healthcare solutions.

Additionally he said, other activities will also be hosted, such as pitch programmes, start-up seeds and USM spin-off companies in order to spur innovation and commercialisation.

“One example of an innovation that was highlighted was the ‘Automated Assisted Breathing Unit’ or AABU. It is an AI-driven breathing tool, combining the expertise in medical, engineering and IT.


Other proposals presented during the discussion include an OECD-accredited GLP facilities; a prerequisite for vaccine or pharmaceutical clinical work at USM-IPHARM; a proposal for 12 USM (Pharmacy) training; future NPRA regulators and clinical experts; Vax Biotech (USM spin-off) commissioning preclinical trial on cholera vaccine; and in developing the most advanced vaccine in Malaysia (a collaboration with AIMST and Finlay Institute in Cuba) for COVID-19 vaccine candidates.

Other USM centres which are ready to offer their expertise include the Institute for Research in Molecular Medicine (INFORMM) and the National Poison Centre.

The Minister was on a one-day working visit to Penang, and USM was one of the venue chosen to discuss several issues in his itinerary.

Others who were present included the Chairperson of the University Board of Governors (LGU), Datuk Dr. Awang Adek Hussin; Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Research and Innovation), Professor Dato’ Ir. Dr. Abdul Rahman Mohamed; MOSTI Secretary-General, Datuk Ir. Dr. Siti Hamisah Tapsir; President of Academy of Sciences Malaysia, Professor Datuk Dr. Asma Ismail; and key officials from MOSTI and USM.

MALAYSIA TECHNOLOGY EXCELLENCE
AWARD FOR DIGITAL - EDUCATION**

Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) has won the Digital-Education award for the entry JORaN (Job Opportunities, Recruitment and Networking) at the recently concluded Malaysia Technology Excellence (MTE) Awards 2021, presented by Singapore Business Review.

Fully developed by a group of USM students, the JORaN mobile app is a platform that brings together USM students, student entrepreneurs and all departments in USM in an employer-employee environment.

A first amongst Malaysian universities, an “employer” (student entrepreneur or department/unit in USM) can choose their “employee” (a USM student) based on the endorsement and comment from past “employers” via the platform. An employer can also search for an employee by submitting the description of their needs and requirements of the job.

JORaN offers various part-time jobs within the campus for students to apply and earn extra income. There are over 30 different types of job categories from waiters to research assistants, and it is available to download for free on both iOS and Android devices.

USM soft-launched JORaN on 4 September 2019 in conjunction with the registration of new students for the 2019/2020 academic session after realising that many university students were looking for part-time jobs to raise money for their studies.



JORaN offers over 30 different part-time job categories within the campus for students to earn extra income. So far, since its inception, more than 400 students have benefited from this effort.

The concept behind the innovation originated from the USM Deputy Vice-Chancellor of Student Development Affairs and Alumni, Professor Dr. Aldrin Abdullah.

The app was fully developed by three USM students from different background and ethnicity - Danny Hartanto Djarum, Asamoah Kwaku Acheampong and Lai Beng Keong under the supervision of Associate Professor Dr. Nurul Hashimah Ahamed Hassain Malim from the School of Computer Sciences.

Danny, who is from Indonesia and studied at the School of Chemical Engineering joined the team in April 2019 and in charge of user interface design of JORaN.

Bangunkan Dua Pelan Perpaduan Negara

Dalam usahanya menjadi institusi yang mengembangkan perpaduan negara, Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) hari ini menandatangani dua memorandum persefahaman (MoU) dengan Kementerian Perpaduan Negara (KPN).

Kedua-dua MoU tersebut yang diterajui oleh Pusat Pengajian Sains Kemasyarakatan (PPSK) adalah berlandaskan objektif utama iaitu Pembangunan Pelan Merakyatkan Perpaduan - Karib Aksesibiliti Majmuk Inklusiviti (KAMI) dan Pemeraksanaan Pelan Tindakan Pembangunan Masyarakat India.

Menandatangani bagi pihak USM ialah Naib Canselornya, Profesor Dr. Faisal Rafiq Mahamd Adikan dan Dekan PPSK, Profesor Dr. Azlinda Azman manakala pihak KPN diwakili Ketua Setiausahaanya Datuk Wan Suraya Wan Md Radzi dan Timbalannya, Dato' Indera Noridah Abdul Rahim.

Sementara itu, Faisal Rafiq ketika berucap pada majlis tersebut berkata, kedua-dua pelan tersebut yang menjadi tunjang kepada MoU ini dijangkakan dapat mendokong tiga aspirasi utama perpaduan negara, iaitu membina rakyat yang patriotik dan demokratik, membentuk identiti nasional dan memperkukuhkan ekosistem perpaduan.

Katanya, Malaysia merupakan negara yang rencam budaya dan lanskap yang sama dapat dilihat di USM yang mana mahasiswanya terdiri daripada pelbagai etnik dan latar belakang yang berbeza.

“USM sentiasa berusaha mewujudkan persekitaran semasa yang menggalakkan integrasi mahasiswa pelbagai etnik, antaranya ialah persekitaran pengajaran dan pembelajaran yang kondusif, kemudahan asas yang lengkap bagi keperluan mahasiswa, kemudahan kewangan yang dapat membantu meringankan beban mahasiswa dan juga aktiviti ko-kurikulum yang merangkumi pelbagai aktiviti badan beruniform, budaya dan sukan.

“Di samping itu, Sekretariat Rukun Negara (SRN) di USM yang seramai 100 orang (40 EXCO dan 60 ahli) juga menjadi platform kepada mahasiswa dalam usaha untuk menerapkan pemahaman dan perpaduan tentang Rukun Negara menerusi program yang dianjurkan.

“Program seperti Lingkaran Muhibbah Orang Asli, Program Eksplorasi Sukan Rakyat dan Perkampungan Sinar Perpaduan adalah antara inisiatif SRN USM sebagai penggerak ke arah memperkukuhkan integrasi nasional dalam kalangan mahasiswa di USM,” tambah beliau.



MOHE MINISTER on A Working Visit to USM

Minister of Higher Education of Malaysia, YB Datuk Seri Dr. Noraini Ahmad had paid a courtesy visit to the main campus of Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) in Penang. She is welcomed by the USM Chairman of the Board of Governors, Dato' Dr. Awang Adek Hussin.

A small occasion then went underway with a brief presentation on USM by its Vice-Chancellor, Professor Dr. Faisal Rafiq Mahamd Adikan, as an introduction to the only APEX University in Malaysia and later followed with a quick Q&A session held with YB Datuk Seri Dr. Noraini.

A few recent USM projects were then highlighted, as the Minister of Higher Education then visited The Bricks. The Bricks, located at Bangunan Siswaniaga, is a centre for student entrepreneurial activity, which underwent extensive renovation and was officially opened in March 2021. It is divided into a Lounge, a Gallery and a Merchandise Shop where students work and simulate a real start-up operation. In order to provide students with real-life entrepreneurship experience, real industry players and alumni will be invited to share their knowledge and experience.

Moving on to Copa Arena@USM, Noraini was introduced to the new artificial football fields which were fully funded via a build-operate-transfer (BOT) deal. The two fields, each measuring 105m x 68m, were made up of 3 artificial and 2 natural turfs. These FIFA standard football fields are open for students at no charge and for outsiders to rent too. Furthermore, there is ongoing discussion to put a Video Assistant Referee (VAR) equipment for the fields in the future.

Then, the visit proceeded to Desa Harapan or Bilik Viral, a new refurbished room with a modern design, complete with air-conditioning and fan. To fund the room and to build more similar rooms, the 'Adopt Your Hostel Room@USM' was introduced as a programme that reaches out to the Alumni and industry player. In addition, Smart Hostel, which is still at a prototype phase, was also presented as a room equipped with artificial intelligence (AI) technology, where voice command can be used.



SALAM FROM PALESTINE, Hoping To Return Soon

When I came to Malaysia to further my studies in 2008, I was equipped with a belief that Malaysia is a country that is rich with many cultures that I must experience, besides obtaining a Master's degree. So, I tried very hard to take advantage of every opportunity to gain new experiences and learn new things about Malaysia, including its lifestyle and its people.

Joining the International Office in 2009 was a great start for me to get to know Malaysia more deeply. By getting to know more Malaysian friends and helping them receive academic exchange students, I learnt and obtained a lot of information about Malaysia and Penang in particular. It helped me to provide answers to all the questions asked by the students.

The most beautiful and unforgettable experience was when I went to a homestay in Pahang for three days to stay at the house of a rural Malaysian family. When I was there, I practiced the daily routines and ate the local food. It was a wonderful experience and I got to meet an amazing Malaysian family. In fact, I am still in contact with them today.

What made me return to Malaysia after ten years to study for my Doctorate is the quality of education at Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM). As it is among the 150 top universities in the world, there are academic supervisors with extensive research experiences that I can benefit from greatly. Then, I can share these experiences with my colleagues in Palestine.

In these challenging times, our people in Gaza are also facing a complex situation. The difficulties here are cumulative and superimposed. The political and economic crises due to the Israeli blockade has made life more difficult and become unbearable at some points.

I have to admit that things worsened after the emergence of COVID-19 due to the acute shortage of sterile materials and aids. The university which I work at has resorted to distance education when the Ministry of Health announced a complete and also partial closure.

Distance education is a difficult experience in Gaza as electrical supply is cut for several hours daily, along with the lack of a stable internet connection. In addition to that, not all students own a computer due to the tough economic situation.

However, these unfortunate circumstances did not stop us from working. We use social networking sites to communicate with students, conduct lectures, and deliver information to them.

I can say that this online learning experience has benefited the students by opening new opportunities and increasing new knowledge as well as professionalism for them. I hope that the lives of people in Gaza will change for the better and the siege will end. I also hope that the COVID-19 pandemic will end so that I can return to Malaysia to do my PhD, which I started a year ago at USM.

My small family saw a lot of pictures and memories in Malaysia and I also hope I can take them on a trip to Malaysia one day.

However, as MLE not popular in Japan, I had difficulty in seeking professional advice. With the help from Assoc. Prof. Rashidi who was always patient and tried to provide necessary assistance, my research deliberately made some progress. Rakyat sentiasa dihimpit kebimbangan dengan situasi semasa dalam negara, baik disebabkan pandemik mahupun ketidakstabilan politik? Adakah dengan laungan semangat kemerdekaan dapat meredakan sedikit tekanan yang rakyat hadapi, atau setidaknya mengalih perhatian ke arah sesuatu perkara yang lebih positif?

Sewajarnya laungan semangat kemerdekaan dapat meredakan suhu politik yang mendidih sehingga membawa kepada keadaan tidak menentu dan ketidakstabilan yang berpanjangan. Walau berbeza fahaman politik, ia tidak boleh menjejaskan usaha untuk meningkatkan penghayatan ke atas nilai kemerdekaan. Memahami pengertian kemerdekaan boleh diperhebatkan di bulan Ogos atau bulan kemerdekaan supaya warga Malaysia sedar betapa sukarnya membina Malaysia tetapi mudah untuk merobohkannya jika kita tidak berhati-hati dengan tindakan kita. Jujurkan kita pada Malaysia? Ini persoalan yang perlu dijawab oleh setiap individu yang menamakan dirinya warga Malaysia kerana kita masih melalui proses untuk membina jati diri yang ampuh dalam kalangan warga kita. Dalam mendepani apa sahaja cabaran, kita perlu mengingatkan diri masing-masing bahawa kesedaran palsu ke atas negara akan memberikan kesan yang cukup besar kepada penghuni negara ini.

Apakah harga yang perlu dibayar jika kita mensia-siakan keharmonian masyarakat berbilang kaum di negara ini?

Malaysia merupakan sebuah negara yang rencam, pelbagai, majmuk dan anekaragam. Meraikan perbezaan dalam kepelbagaian adalah benteng kita kerana dalam apa keadaan sekalipun, perpaduan, kesepaduan dan penyatupaduan menjadi dinding kepada Malaysia meskipun perpaduan diuji dalam keadaan hari ini. Tiga prinsip asas dalam hubungan antara etnik yang kemudiannya membawa kepada perpaduan adalah faham, hormat dan terima yang menjadi kunci perpaduan. Nilai keinsanan dan kehebatan perlu diperteguhkan dengan pematuhan kepada asas hubungan dalam kalangan manusia iaitu bersedia untuk berkompromi dan berkorban dengan diindahi oleh keikhlasan untuk mengatasi virus pandemik ini. Berat sama dipikul, ringan sama dijinjing' dan 'bukit sama didaki, lurah sama dituruni' menjadi amalan dalam kehidupan kita. Keikhlasan perlu ada untuk memastikan kehidupan berukun dan keamanan terpelihara.

Misalnya, perpaduan COVID-19 memerlukan kejujuran bersama. Ia harus datang sendiri dengan perlakuan yang dipersetujui majoriti. Akhlak diri akan menjadi penanda aras untuk kita melangkah berdampingan untuk merealisasikan impian memelihara negara ini bersama. Barangkali kita tidak bergaul, bercampur, bersampingan mahupun bergabung sebelum krisis COVID-19 tetapi hari ini kita boleh teguh selesa bermesra di dunia alam siber. Ini boleh dilanjutkan apabila 'kebiasaan' normal lama akan kembali dalam sedikit masa lagi.

Menyambut ulangtahun kemerdekaan di era pandemik? Apakah alternatif yang boleh dipraktikkan?

Ramai bertanggapan oleh kerana berada di era pandemik, kita tidak boleh meraikan kemerdekaan seperti sebelum ini kerana persoalan penjarakan sosial. Namun, banyak platform lain boleh digunakan. Keluarga masih boleh mengibarkan Jalur Gemilang; sambutan di media sosial dan media konvensional masih boleh diteruskan terutama siaran penceritaan kemerdekaan. Begitu juga secara kreatif, media sosial digunakan untuk jalinan program dan aktiviti kemerdekaan. Malahan, pertandingan bertemakan kemerdekaan masih boleh dilakukan di alam maya. Saya percaya walau program fizikal dilarang, alam maya boleh menjadi telapak untuk membangkitkan semangat jiwa Malaysia di bulan kemerdekaan ini.

Merdeka!

Apakah cara terbaik untuk mendidik masyarakat khususnya generasi muda mengenai erti sebuah kemerdekaan?

Generasi merdeka dan generasi pasca merdeka mempunyai pandangan berbeza mengenai kemerdekaan. Bagi generasi merdeka, mereka melihat sendiri keperitan kehidupan di bawah zaman penjajahan manakala bagi generasi pasca-merdeka, mereka merasakan adalah tanggungjawab pihak berwajib untuk mengurus negara dengan pengisian yang rasional dan praktikal, bukannya emosional. Walaupun begitu, pelbagai agen memainkan fungsi mereka untuk terus mendekati kemerdekaan.

Ia bermula dari rumah bagaimana nilai kemerdekaan bukan sekadar satu slogan tetapi menjadi amalan darah daging kita. Begitu juga peranan sekolah, pentadbir dan guru-guru serta rakan sebaya; peranan media; agensi kerajaan, pemimpin dan diri sendiri perlu mengambil inisiatif untuk memahami dan mahu memahami erti sebuah kemerdekaan. Kepelbagaian pendekatan perlu disesuaikan dengan perubahan demografi dan geografi tanahair. Konsep 'Bela Negara' perlu juga dibawa bersama nilai patriotisme dan nasionalisme warga Malaysia. Walaupun identiti diri kini bermula menjadi 'hybrid identity' atau 'shifting identity', itu tidak bermakna kita boleh abaikan jati diri menjadi warga Malaysia. Perlembagaan dan Rukun Negara adalah dokumen keramat yang secara berterusan digunakan untuk mendidik, menyemai, memupuk dan mengajar erti sebuah kemerdekaan.



Apa Kata Alumni Kita!



Semangat kemerdekaan dan hari bersejarah negara perlu sentiasa diingati dalam apa jua keadaan pun. Ia adalah momen bersejarah yang perlu diingati oleh setiap dari rakyat Malaysia. Sebagai guru, sambutan kemerdekaan di peringkat sekolah sememangnya akan berlainan dari tahun-tahun sebelum pandemik melanda negara. Namun ia bukan halangan untuk semangat itu disemarakkan dalam jiwa anak-anak.



Banyak alternatif normal baharu yang boleh kita praktikkan. Upon gaining a degree in Business Computing and Information Technology from the University of Wales UK, I have been particularly interested in the academic field to help develop my career in that direction. My supervisor, Dr. Syaheerah Lebai Lutfi, was the best supervisor and a mentor I could ever ask for throughout my studies in Malaysia. I have never regretted working with her. As a mixed-mode student, I had the privilege to publish a paper in a highly reputable journal (Q2 journal). All this achievement was guided and mentored by my supervisor, and I learned a lot from her. May ALLAH reward her with Jannatul Firdous.



20 YEARS ON, KANITA CONTINUES to Champion Gender Equality



In conjunction with its 20th anniversary as a Centre of Excellence (CoE) of Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM), the Centre for Research on Women and Gender (KANITA) has conducted a virtual talk entitled "Gender Equality 2021 - The Icelandic Experience".

The talk, presented by the First Lady of Iceland, Madam Eliza Reid, was streamed live via USM Facebook not only to USM staff and students but also colleagues and network beyond the university, at the national and global levels.

"According to Eliza, gender equality doesn't happen on its own accord. It has to be a conscious decision, it has to be something that people will always be aware of and it requires a change in mindset."

"As many of you have probably experienced on your own, there exists gender discrimination, coded in law and there are some forms of lock nearly everywhere in the world and that includes Iceland where we still have some 'unfair' laws such as pensions for example," she said.

Eliza said Iceland topped the World Economic Forum Global Gender Gap Index for the past 12 years, and Iceland was also a member of the UN Human Rights Council until 2009.

"Apart from that, Iceland is signatory to the Istanbul Convention on combating violence against women and domestic violence, while the current government has pledged to eliminate the gender salary gap by 2022.

"On 1st January 2018, Iceland became the first country in the world to make it illegal to pay men more than women for doing the same job. Gender quotas were implemented for the boards of publicly-traded companies and publicly-funded childcare centres.

"Women on national sports teams were also earning the same bonuses as their male counterparts and after the 2016 election, Iceland has the highest number of female MPs of any non-quota regulated parliament," she said.

According to Eliza, gender equality has a powerful potential to improve the economy, security and the overall well-being of a population, and in countries where gender equality is greatly practiced, both men and women are healthier, happier and live longer.

She also shared with the audiences, “the fight for gender equality in Iceland on 24 October 1975 made history when 90% of women in Iceland, in both urban and rural communities, did not go to their paid jobs or do housework or childcare at home, and as a result of that, many industries shut down for the day. Through this historic incident, the first comprehensive Icelandic legislation on equals rights and equal status of women and men was adopted in 1976.”

“Gender equality doesn’t happen on its own accord. It has to be a conscious decision, it has to be something that people will always be aware of and it requires a change in mindset,” she said.

Earlier, in his pre-recorded welcoming speech, USM Vice-Chancellor, Professor Dr. Faisal Rafiq Mahamd Adikan said, USM is continuously making efforts towards bridging the gender gap at all levels - within the organisation and at both the national and international levels.

“We are proud of KANITA that has pioneered gender studies and gender-based research in this country, collaborating with local and global partners in advocacy-related work to empower women and achieve gender equality,” he said.



Open Wall yang dilaksanakan ini menggunakan pendekatan terbuka dan organik untuk membolehkan pengesahan dan penemuan isu-isu, masalah, persoalan, kemungkinan dan potensi berkaitan dengan hubungan antara penghasilan seni dengan kesihatan mental dan kesejahteraan sosial. Seni ternyata memberi kesan positif kepada anak-anak dan juga orang dewasa, malah membentuk kita menjadi seseorang yang lebih gembira. Semasa melukis, seseorang akan melepaskan hormon kortisol iaitu hormon yang berhubungan dengan tekanan. Ia juga dapat memperbaiki aktiviti otak di mana otak akan membebaskan hormon endorfin dan dopamin yang membuatkan kita menjadi lebih gembira.



“Apa yang menarik perhatian saya, terdapat seorang pelukis muda iaitu Harith Darwisy, 14 tahun datang beberapa hari untuk melukis selama 1 hingga 2 jam setiap sesi untuk menyiapkan karya agungnya mengikut tempo sendiri sambil ditemani adik dan bapanya yang juga staf USM.”

“Kami menerima pelbagai reaksi positif daripada para peserta termasuk dari dalam dan luar negara,” kata Hasnul.

“Saya berpendapat, program sebegini sangat memberikan manfaat kepada para pelajar yang ‘terkurung’ di dalam kampus serta dapat mengabadikan hasil kerja tangan dalam memori sepanjang pengajian di USM,” kata Sherin Abdelrahman pula yang berasal dari Palestin dan sedang melanjutkan pengajian di Pusat Pengajian Bangunan, Perumahan dan Perancangan USM.

“Kerjasama yang diberikan oleh warga USM sangat meyakinkan. Ramai yang berminat dan turut serta sehingga memaksa kami menyediakan dinding-dinding baru untuk dilukis. Ianya menimbulkan perasaan seronok dan gembira dalam kalangan peserta walaupun mereka perlu mematuhi SOP yang telah ditetapkan.

“Pada saya *Open Wall* ini telah mencapai sasaran dalam kalangan warga USM dan pihak MGTG USM juga menerima permintaan luar biasa dari rakan-rakan di luar USM untuk menyertai *Open Wall* ini.

“Open Wall yang dilaksanakan ini menggunakan pendekatan terbuka dan organik untuk membolehkan pengesahan dan penemuan isu-isu, masalah, persoalan, kemungkinan dan potensi berkaitan dengan hubungan antara penghasilan seni dengan kesihatan mental dan kesejahteraan sosial.”

“Sehubungan itu, kami telah melancarkan *Open Wall Online* bagi menggalakkan lagi orang awam untuk menyertai program ini secara maya dengan menghantar fail digital lukisan mereka kepada pihak pengurusan MGTG USM.


“Pada perancangannya, lukisan ini akan dipamerkan di galeri maya yang boleh diakses secara atas talian dan juga secara fizikal di dinding-dinding pameran MGTG USM.

Selain itu, MGTG juga bercadang untuk menjadikan *Open Wall* sebagai siri pameran tahunan MGTG USM samada secara terbuka atau tertutup kepada warga USM.

Open Wall ini juga merupakan program dua hala di mana peserta menghasilkan seni visual manakala kakitangan MGTG USM memberi refleksi terhadap subjek atau imej lukisan yang dihasilkan dengan penghasilan objek 3-Dimensi (3D). Objek 3D ini akan diimbas dengan menggunakan *3D Scanner Apps* dan dicetak untuk dipamerkan pada masa hadapan secara fizikal dan atas talian.

“Harapan saya, hasil lukisan ini dijadikan sebagai “soft toys” untuk dijadikan sebagai cenderamata. Dari segi akademik, satu kajian terkait di antara seni dan kesihatan mental akan dilaksanakan berdasarkan hasil soal selidik tahap kepuasan melukis dalam kalangan peserta dan rasa sejahtera yang diperolehi mereka semasa menyertai *Open Wall*. Penulisan ilmiah hasil daripada *Open Wall* ini dirancang untuk dibukukan dan dikatalog secara atas talian untuk tujuan dokumentasi,” tambah Hasnul yang mula dilantik sebagai Pengarah MGTG USM pada 1 Jan 2020 mengakhiri temubual.

USM MULAKAN OPERASI PPV:

Sumbangan Institusi Pendidikan Tinggi Jayakan Program Imunisasi COVID-19 Kebangsaan

Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM) menzahirkan sokongan dan komitmennya dalam Program Imunisasi COVID-19 Kebangsaan (PICK) apabila Pusat Pemberian Vaksin (PPV) di Universiti ini beroperasi secara berperingkat di tiga lokasi berasingan.

Selepas kejayaan pembukaan PPV dan PPV Khas (SPPV) (termasuk secara pandu lalu bagi kes-kes yang berkeperluan) di Hospital USM, Kubang Kerian, Kelantan bermula Mac 2021 yang lalu, PICK di USM kini telah mula dijalankan di dua lagi lokasi di USM iaitu di PPV Dewan Utama Pelajar (Dewan Peperiksaan), Kampus Induk dan PPV Sains@Bertam di Kepala Batas, di sini.



Pengerusi PPV@USM, Profesor Dr. Md Roslan Hashim berkata, Jawatankuasa Khas Jaminan Akses Bekalan Vaksin COVID-19 (JKJAV) yang dipengerusikan secara bersama oleh Menteri Kesihatan Malaysia dan Menteri Sains, Teknologi dan Inovasi ditubuhkan untuk memastikan akses bekalan kepada vaksin COVID-19 untuk negara dapat diperolehi dengan kadar segera, selamat, sempurna dan berkesan.

“Sehubungan dengan itu, USM diberi tanggungjawab untuk menjadi salah sebuah lokasi PPV di bawah PICK. Ia juga selaras dengan usaha Kementerian Pengajian Tinggi (KPT) untuk sama-sama membantu PICK dalam menyediakan akses yang lebih banyak kepada rakyat untuk divaksin,” ujar beliau yang juga Timbalan Naib Canselor Kelestarian dan Pembangunan Institusi USM.

Mengulas mengenai operasi PPV USM, beliau berkata: “Operasi pemberian vaksin di USM melibatkan koordinasi menyeluruh bersama pihak-pihak yang terlibat di bawah Kementerian Kesihatan Malaysia (KKM), Kementerian Sains, Teknologi & Inovasi (MOSTI) pihak berkuasa tempatan, USM dan sebagainya bagi memastikan kelancaran proses vaksinasi kepada penerima.

“USM juga bekerjasama rapat dengan PIC Negeri Pulau Pinang (Pegawai Daerah Timur Laut dan Seberang Perai Utara) untuk menyelaras pembekalan vaksin kepada kedua-dua PPV USM. Penyelaras terperinci ini amat penting untuk dilakukan dengan mengambil kira kapasiti maksimum penerima vaksin di kedua-dua PPV USM adalah sekitar 200 sehingga 1,000 orang sehari,” ujar beliau lanjut.

Operasi Hari Pertama Berjalan Lancar

Meninjau keadaan sebenar di hari pertama PPV@USM dilancarkan di Kampus Induk dan di Sains@Bertam, keadaan berjalan dengan lancar dan semua petugas dapat memberikan komitmen terbaik setelah melalui beberapa siri latihan dan lawatan tapak ke PPV yang sedia beroperasi di sekitar Pulau Pinang.

Pengerusi Lembaga Gabenor Universiti, Dato’ Dr. Awang Adek Hussin juga sempat meluangkan masa turut serta memerhatikan perjalanan operasi PPV di Dewan Utama Pelajar (Dewan Peperiksaan) USM.

Menurut Awang Adek, beliau merasa gembira dan berbangga dengan penglibatan pihak USM dalam menjayakan Program Imunisasi COVID-19 Kebangsaan (PICK) ini.

“Ini adalah agenda kebangsaan, yang mana rakyat perlu diberi vaksin dengan kadar segera. Terima kasih diucapkan kepada Naib Canselor USM, Profesor Dato’ Dr. Faisal Rafiq Mahamd Adikan dan Pengerusi Jawatankuasa PPV@USM, Profesor Dr. Md. Roslan Hashim yang telah bekerja keras dalam memastikan kelancaran pelaksanaan operasi pada hari ini.

“Inilah semangat yang seharusnya ada, dan dengan usaha penuh dedikasi secara berterusan, operasi ini pastinya akan terus mampu dilakukan walaupun dengan peningkatan penerima vaksin dari sekitar Pulau Pinang,” ujarnya lagi.

Untuk rekod, sehingga artikel ini diterbitkan, USM telah menerima ribuan penerima vaksin yang datang untuk mengambil dos pertama dan kedua mereka di PPV@USM.

USM Laksanakan PPV Pandu Lalu: Beri Kemudahan Kepada Komuniti

Selepas kejayaan pembukaan PPV secara statik bermula pada Jun lalu di Pusat Pemberian Vaksin Dewan Utama Pelajar (PPV@USM), operasi PPV ini diteruskan dengan penambahbaikan melalui pelaksanaan kaedah vaksinasi secara pandu lalu bermula pada 23 Julai 2021.

Seperti PPV secara statik, PPV pandu lalu USM juga dikendalikan sepenuhnya oleh warga USM sendiri yang melibatkan sukarelawan staf akademik dan bukan akademik, staf perubatan, pelajar dan juga pesara USM.

Menurut Md. Roslan, kaedah pengoperasian vaksinasi secara pandu lalu ini tertakluk kepada keperluan terhadap kes-kes tertentu sahaja. Beberapa kriteria yang membolehkan penerima vaksin menggunakan kaedah ini termasuklah penerima vaksin dos kedua sahaja, penerima vaksin bersetuju untuk pandu lalu, 15 minit tempoh pemerhatian (ditentukan melalui dos pertama) dan penerima vaksin berada pada tahap kesihatan yang baik.

“Bagi permulaan, PPV@USM dijangka akan menerima sekitar 200 penerima vaksin secara pandu lalu.

USM juga sentiasa bersedia untuk sama-sama membantu menyediakan perkhidmatan yang terbaik dan profesional bagi memastikan hasrat kerajaan dalam mencapai *herd immunity* dapat direalisasikan dengan kerjasama dan sokongan dari KPT, MOSTI, KKM, Kerajaan Negeri dan kementerian serta agensi-agensi lain yang terlibat,” ujar beliau lanjut.



Menarik Di PPV@USM: PPV USM “Beraya” Aidiladha

Satu keunikan timbul di PPV USM baru-baru ini tatkala soal keseriusan masih menjadi keutamaan di setiap PPV di seluruh negara yang masih berjuang untuk memberi sebanyak suntikan yang boleh saban hari agar negara dapat mencapai sasaran imuniti kelompok secepat seperti yang dirancang.

Pada hari kedua Hari Raya Aidiladha (21 Julai 2021) yang disambut seluruh umat Islam di sini menyaksikan petugas-petugas PPV di Dewan Utama Pelajar (DUP) USM mengenakan pakaian kebangsaan ataupun baju raya untuk bertugas melayan penerima vaksin.

Menurut Ketua Penyelaras Pentadbiran PPV USM, Zulkifli Che Hussin, idea ini timbul apabila para petugas dan sukarelawan yang kesemuanya terdiri daripada warga USM sendiri (staf perubatan, staf akademik dan bukan akademik, pelajar malah pesara USM) memberi cadangan secara spontan untuk berbaju raya demi memeriahkan lagi suasana di PPV USM pada hari tersebut.

Bagi sukarelawan daripada kalangan pelajar pula, ini adalah salah satu cara bagi mereka untuk meraikan Hari Raya Aidiladha kali ini tatkala jadual yang padat dengan peperiksaan akhir semester yang dilalui dan juga pada yang belum atau tidak dapat pulang lagi ke kampung halaman.

‘Uncle Plastik’ Berhati Mulia Viral di Media Sosial dan Media Cetak

Cabaran bidang tugas personaliti yang diketengahkan pada edisi kali ini bukan calang-calang hebatnya. Beliau sering dijadikan tempat rujukan jika berlakunya kes-kes berkait dengan bidang tugas perubatan dan kesihatan, secara tidak langsung menjaga kesejahteraan seluruh warga kampus Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM). Ditambah pula dengan pandemik COVID-19 yang kian menggusarkan setiap daripada rakyat Malaysia pada ketika ini, sosok tubuh kecil molek ini makin dihimpit kesibukan.

Beliau cocok digelar *The Iron Lady*. Pun begitu ketika gelaran itu diletakkan padanya, beliau lantas terus merendah diri. Hanya yang keluar dari kata-katanya: "Usaha ini bukan daripada saya semata-mata. Saya berbangga dan amat bersyukur dapat menjalankan tugas dalam suasana yang cukup kondusif. Kerjasama yang erat di antara semua pihak yang banyak menjayakan kerja-kerja harian saya dan juga para *frontliners* kesihatan di USM ini."

Begitu *humble* beliau melontar kata-katanya. Beliau yang dimaksudkan ialah Pengarah Pusat Sejahtera USM, Dr. Normala Abdul Wahid yang sudah pasti dalam rutin hariannya sebagai ketua jabatan yang mengawal selia hampir 90 staf, doktor perubatan, isteri, ibu, anak dan sebagainya, pelbagai cabaran hadir yang menuntut beliau untuk bertindak sewajarnya. Pun begitu, apa yang mengagumkan, anak jati Pulau Pinang ini dilihat tidak pernah tunduk pada tekanan. Malah, kelibatnya sentiasa ada khususnya di saat-saat getir Universiti perlu menguruskan pandemik ini dengan sebaiknya.

Semangat Kerja Berpasukan Jayakan Pengurusan Pandemik COVID-19 USM

Beliau yang berpengalaman hampir 21 tahun bertugas di Pusat Sejahtera USM berkata, perkara yang paling disyukurnya adalah dikurniakan staf yang berdedikasi dan sentiasa bersedia menjalankan tugas pada bila-bila masa yang diperlukan. Malah katanya, pandemik ini membuka matanya betapa kerjasama dan bekerja secara berpasukan adalah faktor terpenting dalam memastikan objektif atau matlamat organisasi dapat dijayakan dengan sebaiknya.

“Tanpa *teamwork* dan apabila semua orang mahu bekerja mengikut caranya sendiri, ia akan menyukarkan kerja kita untuk menyelesaikan sesuatu isu. Saya teruja mengatakan kerjasama di antara semua pihak di USM, baik daripada pengurusan tertinggi, staf bukan kesihatan sehinggalah kepada komitmen pasukan kerja di bawah seliaan saya di PS, ia adalah melangkaui perkataan hebat.”

“Walaupun adakalanya tanggungjawab berat yang Universiti terpaksa hadapi sepanjang menguruskan pandemik memberikan cabarannya tersendiri, namun kita berjaya mencari jalan penyelesaian kerana semua orang tahu tugas masing-masing dan saling hormat-menghormati terhadap peranan semua pihak. Saya juga tidak pernah menghadapi masalah untuk meminta sokongan dan kerjasama daripada semua pihak dalam USM. Sehingga kini semangat bekerja secara berpasukan seperti yang dipraktikkan di USM adalah yang terbaik bagi saya. Hal ini kerana setiap daripada kita tahu apa matlamat utama Universiti, iaitu memberikan hanya yang terbaik buat semua,” ujar beliau.

Di Sebalik Pandemik COVID-19

“Seperti kebanyakan dari kita semua, saya juga turut terkesan dengan perkembangan pandemik ini sejak di hari pertama saya mengetahuinya melalui media-media massa. Masih saya ingat pada ketika COVID-19 ini sedang merebak dengan cepat di China, kita juga dalam masa yang sama akan menerima pelajar-pelajar dari beberapa wilayah di negara itu. Ia mula mendatangkan kerisauan jauh di lubuk hati saya.”

“Sehingga kini semangat bekerja secara berpasukan seperti yang dipraktikkan di USM adalah yang terbaik bagi saya. Hal ini kerana setiap daripada kita tahu apa matlamat utama Universiti, iaitu memberikan hanya yang terbaik buat semua.”



“Namun saya turut bersyukur kerana di USM, walaupun ada kes-kes terpencil berlaku, kita berjaya mengawalinya dengan baik hasil daripada usaha kolektif semua pihak.”

“Sepertinya naluri saya mengatakan kita perlu melakukan sesuatu. Kita perlu mengambil pendekatan mencegah virus berbahaya itu dari menular di negara ini khususnya di Menara Ilmu ini. Malah pada ketika itu kerana ia masih di peringkat terlalu awal, tiada sebarang sekatan yang dikenakan kepada mana-mana pihak yang masuk ke Malaysia. Pun begitu, saya meminta untuk pihak Universiti mengadakan satu mesyuarat bagi melihat perkara ini dengan lebih teliti dan menyeluruh supaya wujud satu koordinasi untuk proses kemasukan pelajar-pelajar ini dapat dilakukan dengan sewajarnya,” ujar Dr. Normala.

Namun, tidak pula disangka perebakan wabak itu mula dikesan di negara ini. Dari satu kes ke satu kes sehinggalah wujudnya satu kluster yang agak besar jumlahnya. “Saya juga tidak pernah terfikir bahawa virus ini boleh menular sehingga ke tahap ini di negara kita (kes tertinggi dicatatkan melebihi 21,000 kes).

“Namun saya turut bersyukur kerana di USM, walaupun ada kes-kes terpencil berlaku, kita berjaya mengawalinya dengan baik hasil daripada usaha kolektif semua pihak. Sejak dari awal pandemik lagi kita telah menyusun strategi yang sepatutnya termasuk menyediakan blok-blok pengawasan, pengasingan dan sebagainya. Kita telah menjangkakan wabak ini dan risikonya sebelum keluarnya sebarang arahan untuk kuarantin kepada mereka yang baru tiba dari luar negara dan sebagainya,” ujar beliau lanjut.

Tanggungjawab Digalas Dengan Baik Rentetan Pengalaman

Ketika ditanya mengenai kemampuannya menyerap segala tekanan, di saat semua pihak kebanyakannya tertumpu kepada beliau bagi mendapatkan respon segera bagi isu-isu yang berkait dengan bidang tugas kesihatan, Dr. Normala mengakui beliau bersyukur kerana pengalaman kerjaya sejak mula menyertai barisan petugas kesihatan di bawah Kementerian Kesihatan Malaysia (KKM) amat membantunya.

“Saya sebenarnya mula berkhidmat bersama KKM sebaik menamatkan MBBS dari Universiti Malaya. Semasa saya memulakan *housemanship*, saya amat teruja kerana berpeluang bekerja bersama-sama dengan pakar-pakar hebat dan konsultan dalam bidang perubatan. Kemudiannya saya telah dilantik menjadi Ketua di Pejabat Kesihatan Daerah Barat Daya dan mengurus serta menyelia pusat-pusat kesihatan di Bayan Lepas, Air Putih dan juga Teluk Bahang.”

“Banyak yang saya lalui dalam fasa ini dan saya berpengalaman menguruskan pelbagai perkara di bawah *communicable diseases* termasuk denggi, air dan makanan, *maternal and child health*, pesakit luar, perubatan kesihatan konvensional dan sebagainya. Justeru ia sedikit sebanyak menambahkan pengalaman saya menguruskan pelbagai jenis penyakit-penyakit berkaitan komuniti,” ujarnya yang turut memiliki ijazah sarjana dalam bidang Perubatan Komuniti (*Master Of Community Medicine*).

Tambah beliau, ada satu ketika Pulau Pinang digemparkan dengan kes *typhoid* dan ia berlaku di Gertak Sanggul, satu kawasan di daerah Barat Daya. Justeru, beliau terlibat secara langsung dalam pengurusan wabak berkenaan. “Kami menjalankan pelbagai proses yang berkaitan termasuk mengenal pasti dari mana punca ia berlaku, melakukan penjejakan kontak (*contact tracing*) dan sebagainya. Kami bersungguh-sungguh menjalankan tanggungjawab pada ketika itu dan tahu apa yang sepatutnya dilakukan, menangani masalah itu dan membangunkan SOP yang diperlukan.”

Malah ujarnya, ketika di awal perkhidmatannya bersama USM, beliau turut berpengalaman membantu secara langsung menguruskan wabak SARS, iaitu dalam tahun 2004. Ketika itu juga Universiti terpaksa menguruskan kemasukan pelajar-pelajarnya yang berisiko. “Alhamdulillah kita dapat menguruskannya dengan baik termasuk menyediakan desasiswa sebagai blok isolasi. Apa yang saya boleh simpulkan, pengalaman dan kerjasama erat di antara semua pihak memungkinkan tanggungjawab yang dirasakan berat menjadi lebih mudah. Tambahan pula, saya pernah bersama KKM dan sehingga kini hubungan baik dengan pihak berkenaan masih terjalin dan saya tidak berdepan kesukaran mendapatkan kerjasama dari mereka,” ujar Dr. Normala yang memulakan kariernya bersama USM pada tahun 2000.



Cabaran Bergelar *Frontliners*, Pemimpin Organisasi Dan Suri Hati Keluarga

Cabaran dalam menggalas pelbagai peranan dalam kehidupan seharian adalah sesuatu yang sering diperkatakan dan bukan semua individu berupaya memainkan peranan dengan sebaiknya. Dr. Normala juga tidak terlepas dari cabaran bergelar isteri, ibu, anak dan juga pemimpin dalam satu organisasi yang besar, ditambah pula ketika negara bergelut dengan virus COVID-19 yang belum berkesudahan. Pun begitu, *Iron lady* USM ini disifatkan tidak pernah mengalah dan beliau sentiasa ada di saat suka dan duka USM.

Menurut beliau, rasa kecintaan (*passion*) terhadap bidang tugas membuatnya terus teguh berbakti. “Saya tidak dapat bekerja dalam suasana yang tiada cabaran. Itu membosankan. Saya merasakan dalam kehidupan ini kita perlu ada cabaran. Corak kerja sebegini memberi kepuasan kepada saya,” katanya yang tidak pernah mengeluh dalam menggalas tanggungjawab, walaupun adakalanya perlu keluar di malam hari untuk menunaikan amanahnya.

Mengulas rahsianya membahagikan masa di antara karier dan keluarga, Dr. Normala sekali lagi menegaskan beliau bertuah kerana memiliki sistem sokongan (keluarga dan staf) yang memahami dan banyak membantu mempermudah urusan hariannya. Suami beliau yang juga pernah menyarung uniform Polis Diraja Malaysia (PDRM) sentiasa memberi sokongan dan faham dengan cabaran tugas bergelar *frontliners* kerana kedua-dua mereka berada dalam kategori yang sama.

“Saya juga bersyukur kerana masih diberikan kesempatan merasai kasih seorang ibu. Ibu saya tinggal bersama-sama dan sehingga kini di usianya yang mencecah 79 tahun, Allah SWT masih memberi kekuatan kepadanya untuk terus membantu saya. Ibu banyak menyumbang dalam melengkapi hidup kami sekeluarga kerana pada ketika saya dan suami sibuk dengan urusan membantu masyarakat, beliau sentiasa ada memberi dorongan dan membantu di mana yang perlu,” ujar ibu kepada tiga cahaya mata ini yang turut mengakui mereka sekeluarga memang telah lama menganggap ibunya sebagai ketua keluarga yang selalu membimbing dalam kehidupan mereka. Paling melucukan, Dr. Normala mengakui dalam nada ketawa, ketiga-tiga anaknya tidak bercita-cita menjadi doktor dan polis, mungkin kerana ‘takut’ melihat kesibukan kedua-dua ibu bapa mereka.

Pandemik COVID-19: Perkongsian Sebuah Pengalaman

Editorial turut berkesempatan menebual figura hebat ini berkenaan pengalamannya berdepan pandemik COVID-19. Ikuti temubual seperti di bawah:

Apakah pengalaman yang tidak dapat dilupakan sepanjang menguruskan pandemik di USM?

Salah satu aspek penting dalam pengurusan kesihatan ialah kerahsiaan maklumat pesakit. Justeru, pada awal terdapatnya kes positif melibatkan pelajar USM, nama dan maklumat berkenaan pesakit telah dibocorkan secara tidak sengaja sehingga menjadi viral. Saya amat kesal dan sedih kerana ianya berlaku. Ia adalah satu isu berkaitan etika perubatan dan segala maklumat sepatutnya sulit dan dirahsiakan. Saya sama sekali tidak menjangkakan ia berlaku dan tular begitu cepat. Pun begitu, ia mengajar saya dan pasukan saya untuk lebih berhati-hati khasnya melibatkan maklumat sulit. Saya juga sentiasa berwaspada dengan media sosial yang kita tahu bagaimana pantasanya maklumat disebarkan dan mempengaruhi masyarakat.

Saya tidak dapat melupakan perkara itu kerana ia amat mendukacitakan. Stigma masyarakat pada ketika itu menjadikan keadaan lebih buruk dan ia meninggalkan kesan yang mendalam bukan sahaja buat pesakit dan keluarganya, malah diri saya sendiri. Ia bukan sesuatu yang baik untuk saya kenang sepanjang karier saya.

Apakah sisi positif yang diperoleh daripada pandemik ini?

Kerjasama. Saya tidak akan mampu menggalas tanggungjawab ini jika tiada kerjasama mantap dan pasukan USM yang hebat. Semangat kerja berpasukan antara petugas kesihatan dan bukan kesihatan dalam kampus amat saya banggakan. Selain itu kita mempunyai maklumat yang komprehensif kerana sering bekerjasama dengan pelbagai pihak luar seperti KKM, JKN, dan juga Majlis Kesihatan Universiti Awam (MAKESUM) dan ia membantu proses *brainstorming*, perkongsian idea dan proses-proses yang perlu kita laksanakan untuk menguruskan pandemik.

Proses ini sentiasa berubah-ubah mengikut keadaan. Namun kita sentiasa bersedia dan menjangkakan apa yang bakal berlaku dan membangunkan SOP yang sewajarnya melalui Nerve Centre dan semua pihak yang terlibat. Paling mengujakan, kita sentiasa mengambil jalan penyelesaian secara kolektif hasil perbincangan dan persetujuan bersama. Begitulah caranya kita menguruskan pandemik ini di dalam kampus dan saya teruja kerana kita jarang menghadapi masalah untuk membuat keputusan kerana semua pihak memberi input dengan cemerlang.

Apakah jangkaan seterusnya?

Pandemik ini banyak mengubah cara kita bekerja. Normal baharu mengambil tempat dalam urusan harian kita. Kita perlu melihat di luar normal dalam menjalankan rutin Universiti termasuk dalam hal berkaitan kemasukan pelajar, konvokesyen, menguruskan pelajar-pelajar kita jika berlakunya kes-kes positif dan KKM tidak lagi mampu menampung jumlah kes yang semakin tinggi saban hari.

Perkara-perkara sebegini perlu diambil perhatian selagi pandemik ini belum selesai.

USM kini turut menjadi salah sebuah Pusat Pemberian Vaksin. Bagaimana caranya untuk mendidik atau meyakinkan masyarakat untuk mengambil vaksin?

Saya berpendapat, ada sekumpulan masyarakat yang bukan tidak mahu mengambil vaksin, namun lebih kepada 'nanti dahulu' atau 'lihat pengalaman orang lain dahulu'. Kita perlu memberi pendedahan yang sewajarnya dan yakinkan bahawa mengambil vaksin adalah tanggungjawab bersama dalam membantu merealisasikan '*herd immunity*'.

Namun bagi golongan anti-vaksin, usaha untuk meyakinkan mereka agak sukar kerana pengaruh daripada pelbagai maklumat yang mereka baca dan ikuti di media sosial lebih kuat. Namun apa yang penting bagi saya, jika kita tidak mahu mengambil vaksin, itu adalah pilihan sendiri dan jangan bertindak untuk mempengaruhi pihak lain untuk melakukan tindakan serupa.


Saya harap lebih ramai sedar tentang kebaikan vaksin dan betapa kritikalnya kita untuk membantu negara keluar dari pandemik ini. Banyak kehilangan dan kesengsaraan yang kita terpaksa hadapi kesan daripada pandemik ini. Justeru adalah amat penting untuk kita memikirkan mengenai kesusahan orang lain dan tidak mempengaruhi orang lain untuk menjadi tidak mengambil vaksin.

Ini adalah saat yang paling getir untuk kita melindungi diri dan keluarga dengan memastikan kita melakukan perkara yang betul. Sebagai contoh; mengambil vaksin, jika sakit dapatkan rawatan di fasiliti kesihatan, jika berdepan isu kesihatan mental, jangan malu mendapatkan pertolongan. Banyak talian-talian yang disediakan untuk membantu kita menghadapi tekanan dan *stress*. Kita juga jangan mudah percaya kepada berita palsu. Dapatkan fakta yang benar dan tepat khususnya yang berkait dengan kesihatan.

Akhir sekali, ingin saya tegaskan khusus untuk warga USM, jika anda memerlukan sokongan dan bantuan, silalah ke Pusat Sejahtera kerana kami sedia membantu anda. Kita perlu mengekalkan semangat bekerjasama dan amalan kerja sebagai satu pasukan untuk memastikan kita dapat mencapai matlamat utama Universiti.



The 'LIGHT DORMITORIES'

Blocks 10, 11 and 12 (buildings H20, H23 and H24) are three of a kind. They are like the soldiers who once occupied the premises. Despite the blemishes that come with age, they stand strong and proud, full of character and charm, in a neat row. Through the years, they have never faltered under the relentless onslaught of their enemies - the harsh tropical weather. Contrary to the sterile identities that the word "barracks" seem to suggest, these enduring edifices still effortlessly cast their own peculiar kind of enchantment.

Widely acknowledged as the 'heart' of Desasiswa Cahaya, where the undergraduate dormitories are, all three represent the last remaining vestiges of old world charm. What is perhaps most enduring is the spirit that makes H20, H23 and H24 unique. Perhaps it is also a case of 'first love' to the early Mindeners.

Cuddled by the shady *pukul lima* trees, these old army barracks offer a blissful break for those longing for the laidback ambiance of a peaceful kampong which many pioneering inhabitants yearned for. It was this impression of repose that gave encouragement and motivation to many and it makes a particularly convenient stay for those wanting to indulge in a bit of nostalgia and those thrilling days of yesteryear.

Strategically located in a row along Lorong Cahaya, each dormitory has a two-storey footprint of approximately 14,000 square feet of floor area which share common access to wide recreational open spaces in between the buildings which were once army drill grounds. This forges the spirit of neighbourliness, which was fairly pervasive.





The apparent visual qualities of the three buildings were once compared by pioneering student Fatimah Busu in the early '70s to "... the grounds of an ethereal palace set within woods..." Her sense of awe and wonderment holds good till today. Indeed, these three stalwarts of 1938 buildings represent consistent examples of 'palatial' army barracks more than any other military structure on the campus. The three buildings are certainly the best positioned barracks and were eye-catchers in their heyday. The distinctive chamfered colonnade verandahs on the ground floor facade are attentively compelling.

Old pictures have brought to light a great deal of evidence that the buildings, despite their 'regality', provided a sense of respite and seclusion. The staid-looking 'palace' of H20, H23 and H24 were once a restful haven to a large number of British and Commonwealth military personnel. In the early 50s, transient guests included the first Battalion of Queen's Own Royal West Kent Regiment and the first Battalion of Manchester Regiment, their presence adding prestige to the memory and history of these barracks. As the picture testifies, the buildings had much original character with a wide verandah around the peripheral enclosure. Even though the architectural style can be traced to Gujarati origins, the expression, however, is entirely vernacular.

Through the years it has gone by many names: The Barracks, The Royal Army Service Corps (RASC) Stores, The British Army Children School, among others. In 1971, each barracks was tastefully refurbished to meet the requirement for 26 rooms to accommodate 2 or 3 students to a room. They now go by the name Desasiswa Cahaya, literally the 'Light Dormitories'.

The modest barracks exude quiet dignity without being luxurious. It might not be plush but the room could be rented for a meagre price. Back in the early 70s the room rate was Malaysian \$8.80. Yes, that's right...Malaysian \$8.80 per week! The comfort provided by the 240 sq ft room is surprisingly satisfying to those who have stayed there. The air that wafts across the rooms is cool, refreshed by the whirl of the old General Electrical Company (more popularly known as GEC) ceiling fans, a definite invitation for an afternoon siesta.

In more than 70 years of their existence, the premises have endured remarkably well up till now. One would expect dilapidated walls and worn-out corners but surprisingly all remain intact as if the walls were plastered just yesterday. This is another silent testament to the quality of "old world" construction. What was once the heart of Desasiswa Cahaya, however, is now being encroached on by development, which could be a prelude to all manner of surprises. The appearance and the ambiance of the place may be rapidly changing but their intrinsic character and charm have remained. Those who knew H20, H23, and H24 during the earlier years can continue to reminisce through the stories of the early years despite the current transformation.


